a lucky month in the next year**



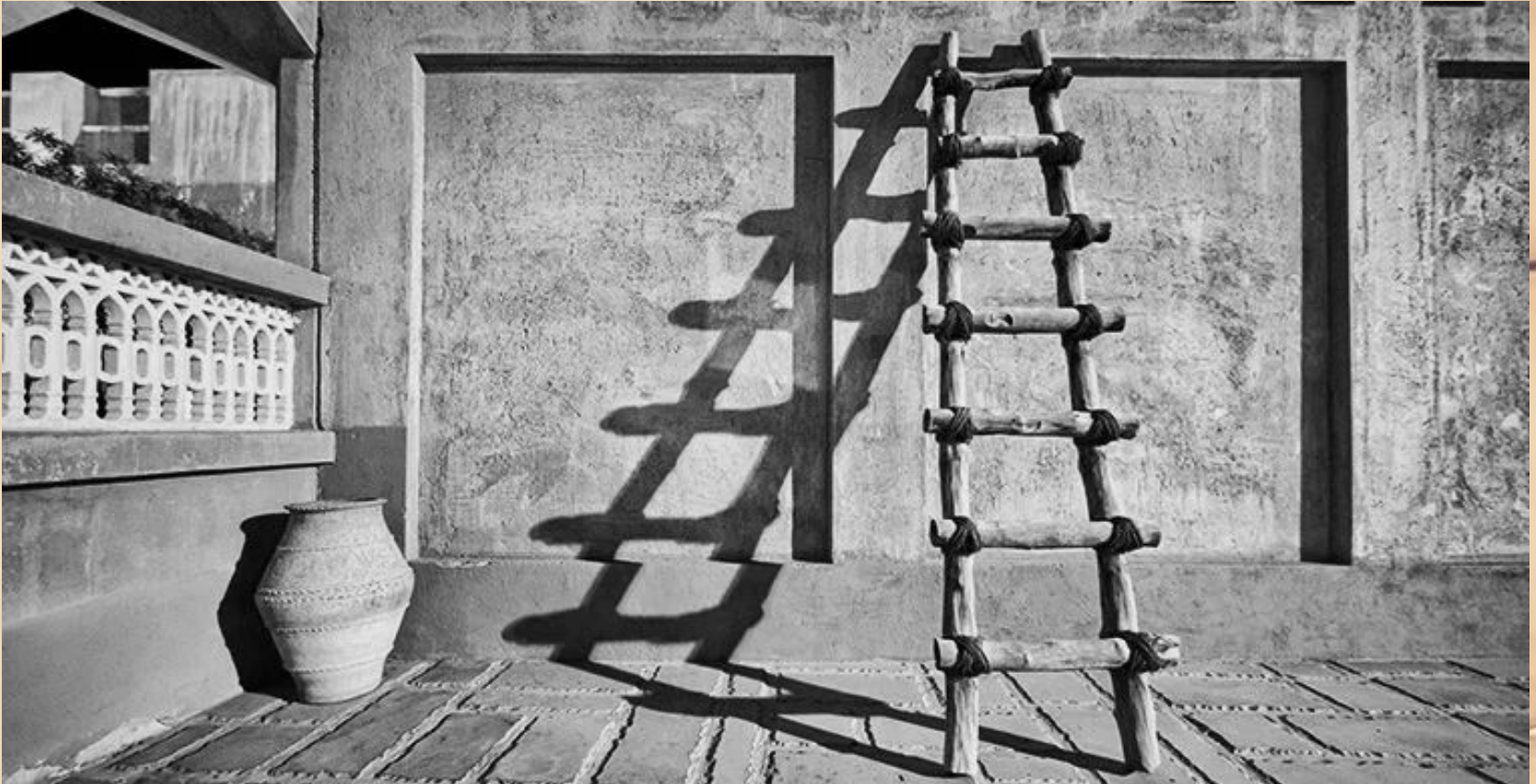
**The people in love usually cook salty
