

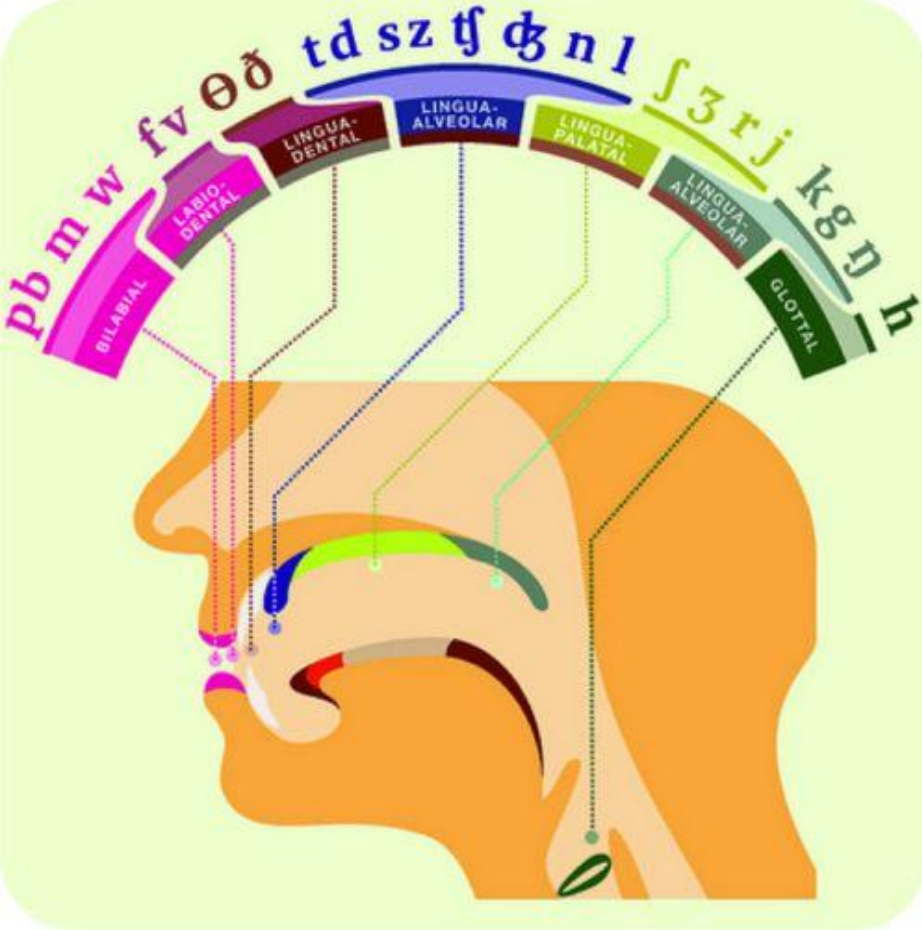

Особенности английской фонетики

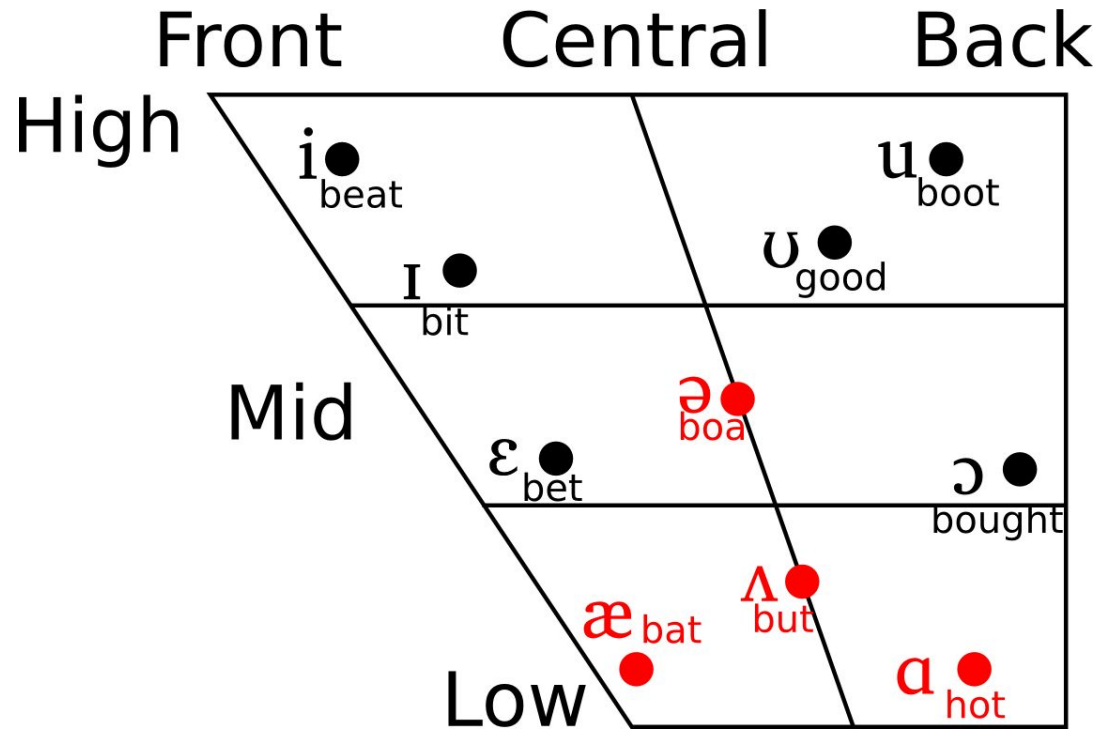
- Положение произносительных органов: плоский уклад губ, губы растянуты, кончик языка оттянут от зубов, задняя часть языка опущена, мягкое нёбо приподнято
- Отсутствие оглушения звонких согласных в финальной позиции
- Частичное оглушение звонких согласных в начальной позиции
- Энергичное произнесение глухих согласных

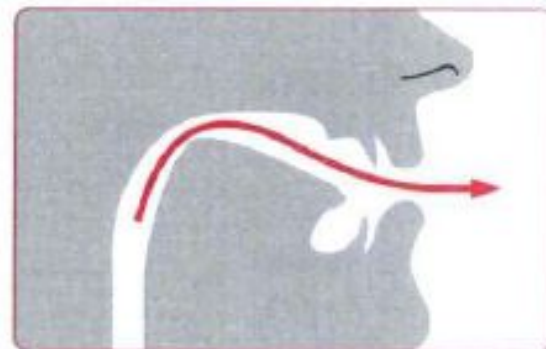
How many hours?

/h/

How to make the sound /h/



- Look at the diagram. Listen and say the sound. The air comes through a small gap at the back of the mouth. There is no voicing. Target sound: /hə/



Sound and spelling



- /h/ is usually spelled **h**, but it is spelled **wh** in a few words. Listen and say these words.

h **hat** **here** **help** **hot** **how** **behind**
wh **who** **whose** **whole**

Note: /bi:/ is the name of the letter B in the alphabet.

Sometimes it's difficult to hear /ə/. Listen.

I have to go to London tomorrow.

banana

Would you like a banana?

This is very important for listening, because it makes it difficult to recognise words. When you speak English, you don't need to pronounce weak sounds as weakly as this, but it's important to make a clear difference between stressed (strong) and unstressed (weak) syllables.

Word Stress

- Make it longer. **S**aturday
- Make it louder. **Sat**urday
- Make it higher. **Sat**urday

Individual words have a stress pattern, that is a pattern of strong and weak syllables. Sentences also have a stress pattern, and this is *sentence stress*. Sometimes a word and a sentence have the same stress pattern. Listen to these examples.
