## Countable nouns

1. Minute-minutes, boy - boys, leaf-leaves
2. Child-children, mouse-mice, man-men
3. A sheep - nine sheep, one salmon-four salmon
4. How many? How many biscuits would you like?


## Uncountable nouns

1. Ask the question How much...?

- How much water do you want?

2. Use some or any

I have some information for you.
Have you got any mineral water


## Something specific and individual

I'd like a glass of water (count.)
Windows are made from glass (uncoun.)
Would you like a coffee?
Where does coffee come from?


## Using some

- SOME - affirmative sentences for uncountable nouns/plural count. nouns
- There's some water in the bottle.
- Some friends are coming round tonight.
- Some -in offers and requests.
- Would you like some fruit?
- Can I have some sugar, please?


## Using <br> any

- Any - in negative sentences.
- He hasn't got any money or friends.
- There isn't any milk.
- Any - in questions.
- Have you got any notes from the last lesson?
