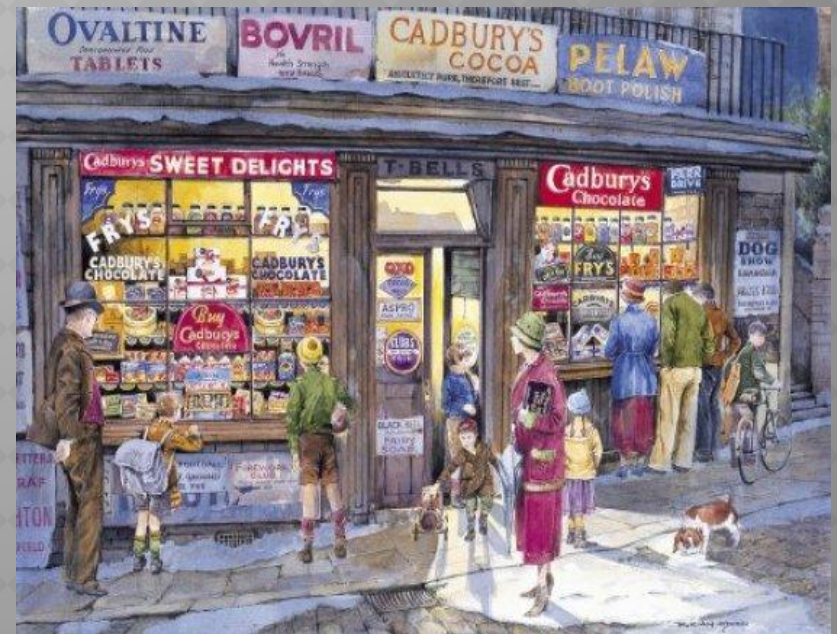

- "That's 50 pence change. Thank you very much and come again."

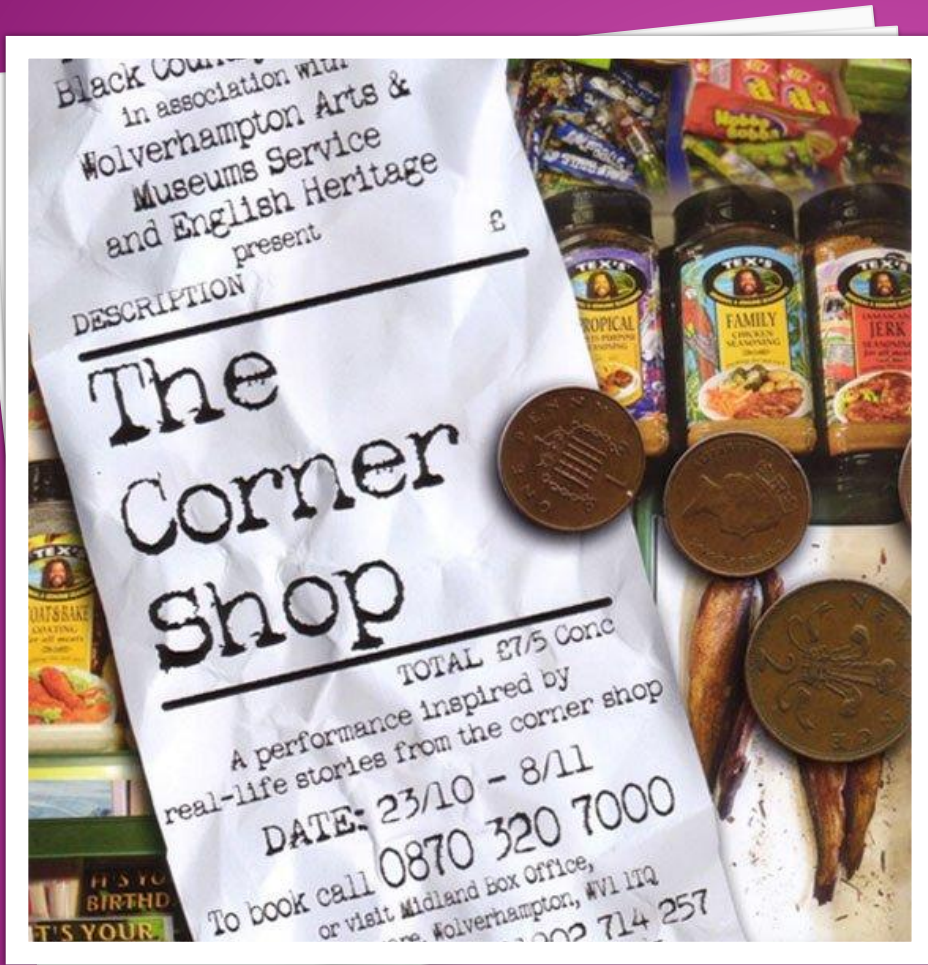
