I DO not (DON'T) like playing football.

DO you like playing football? Yes, I DO. No, I DON'T.

We DO not (DON'T) go to school every day.

DO you go to school every day? Yes, we DO. No, we DON'T.

Students DO not (DON'T) always study their lessons.

DO students always study their lessons? Yes, they DO. No, they DON'T.

It DOES not (DOESN'T) often rain here.

DOES it often rain here? Yes, it DOES. No, it DOESN'T.

He DOES not (DOES'T) like music.

Your mother DOES not (DOESN'T) always cook breakfast.

DOES your mother always cook breakfast? Yes, she DOES. No, she DOESN'T.

Bob DOES not (DOESN'T) play football.

DOES Bob play football? Yes, he DOES. No, he DOESN'T.

**DID you go to school three days ago? Yes,
we DID. No, we DIDN'T.**

Future Simple Tense.

I, WE – WILL/SHALL

YOU, THEY, IT, SHE, HE - WILL

Future Simple Tense.

I WILL/SHALL go to the park next week.

You WILL swim in the sea in five days.

Kate WILL buy some gifts tomorrow.

Future Simple Tense.

I WILL NOT/SHALL NOT (WON'T/SHAN'T) go to the park next week.

You WILL NOT (WON'T) swim in the sea in five days.

Kate WILL NOT (WON'T) buy some gifts tomorrow.

Future Simple Tense.

WILL /SHALL we go to the park next week? Yes, we **WILL/SHALL**.

No, we **WON'T/SHAN'T**.

WILL you swim in the sea in **five days**? Yes, I **WILL/SHALL**.

No, I **WON'T/SHAN'T**.

WILL Kate buy some gifts **tomorrow**? Yes, she **WILL**. No, she **WON'T**.
