





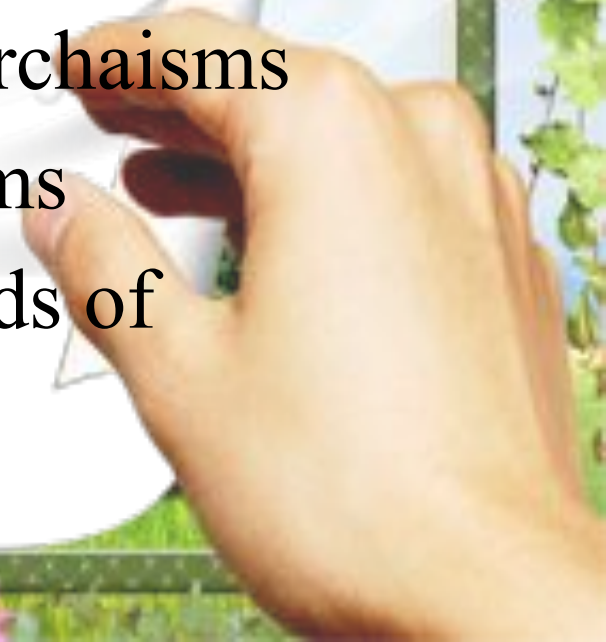

- Galperin's distinguishes 3 stages in aging process the words have passed:
 - **1 – In the English language these are the corresponding verbal ending-est:**
 - For example:
 - Say – sayest
 - go – goest
 - throw – throwest.

2 – archaic word are those that have already gone completely out of use but are still recognized by the English – speaking community.

- For example:

- nay – no

- yea – yes.

- These words are called obsolete

Which may be called archaic proper , are words that are no longer recognizable in Modern English .

- For example:
- to wot – wist
- to know – knew
- brach - hound



They classify the archaisms on the followings groups:

1) Lexical archaisms.

- For example:
- Prithee (to ask)
- Thou (you)

2) Lexico – word-building archaisms

- For example: madest – made , showest – show , knowest = know

3) Lexico – phonetic archaisms

- For example:
- ney= no
- yea=yes

4) Lexico – semantic archaisms

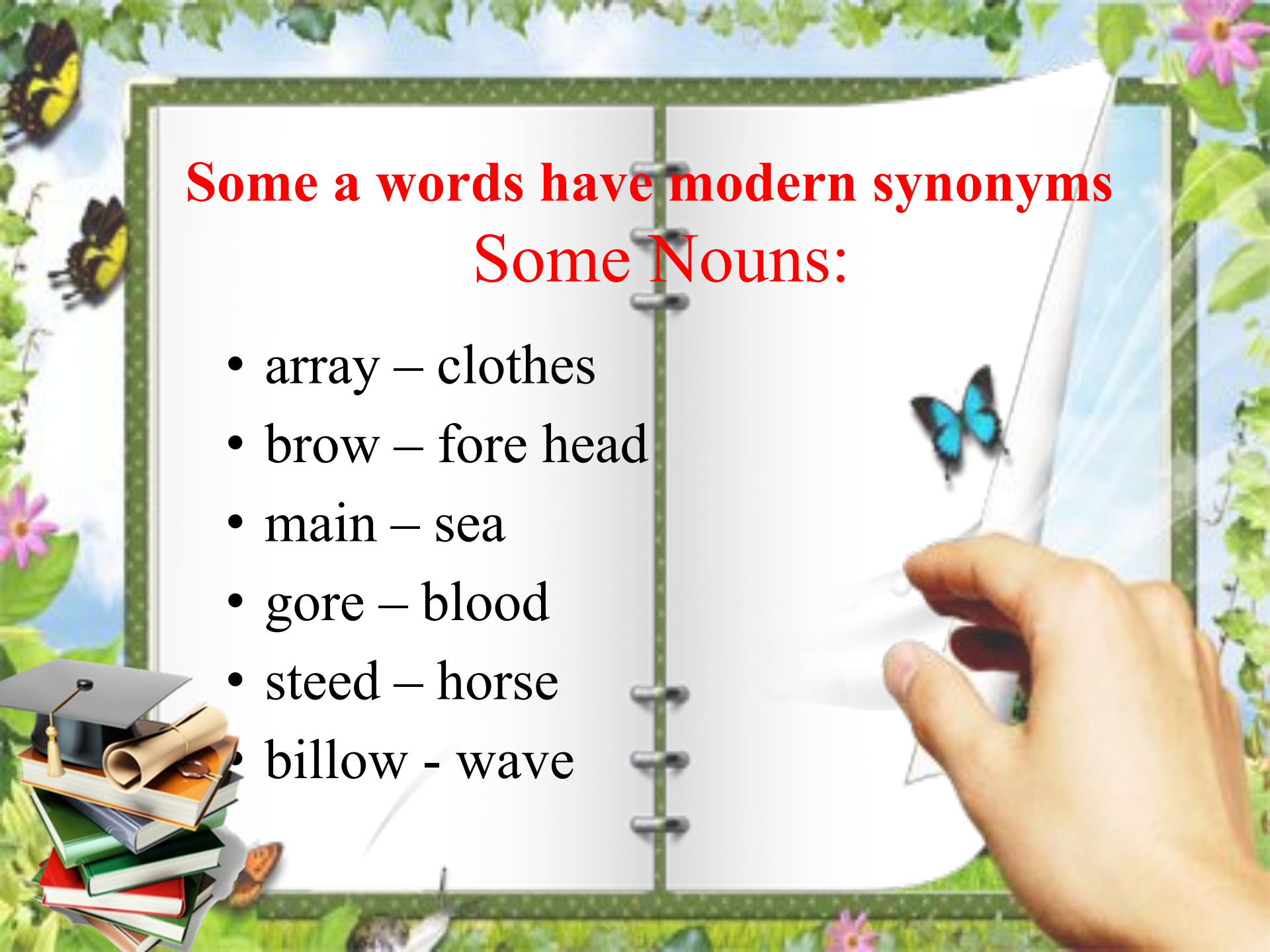
- For example: the phoneme “dream” changed it’s meaning from “ joy, festivity, noisy meriment” – to “ a sleeping vision”
