Giving cards or gifts is also a tradition.



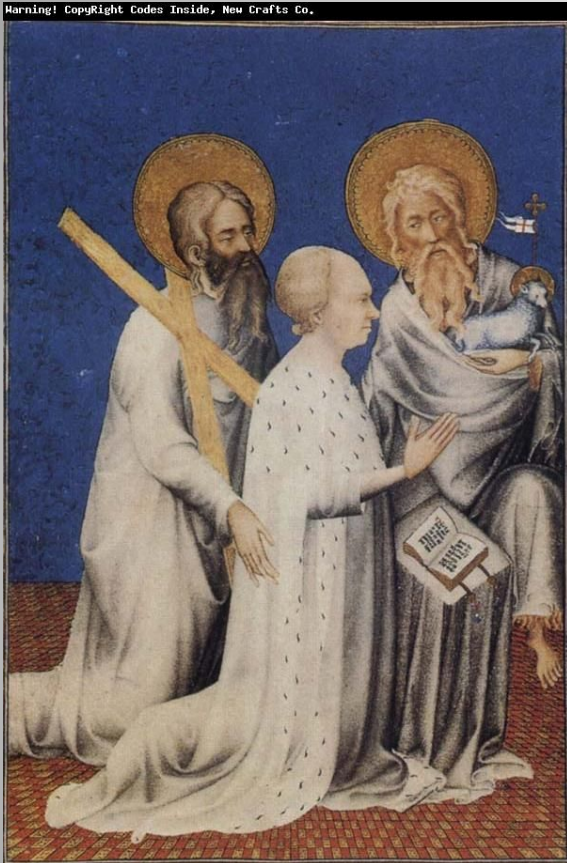

St. Andrew

- St. Andrew's Day (the 30th of November) is regarded as Scotland's national day. On this day some Scotsmen wear a thistle in their buttonhole. The Order of the Thistle is one of the highest orders of knighthood. It was founded in 1687, and is mainly given to Scottish noblemen (limited to 16 in number).





George



St. George's Day falls on 23

April and is regarded as England's national day.

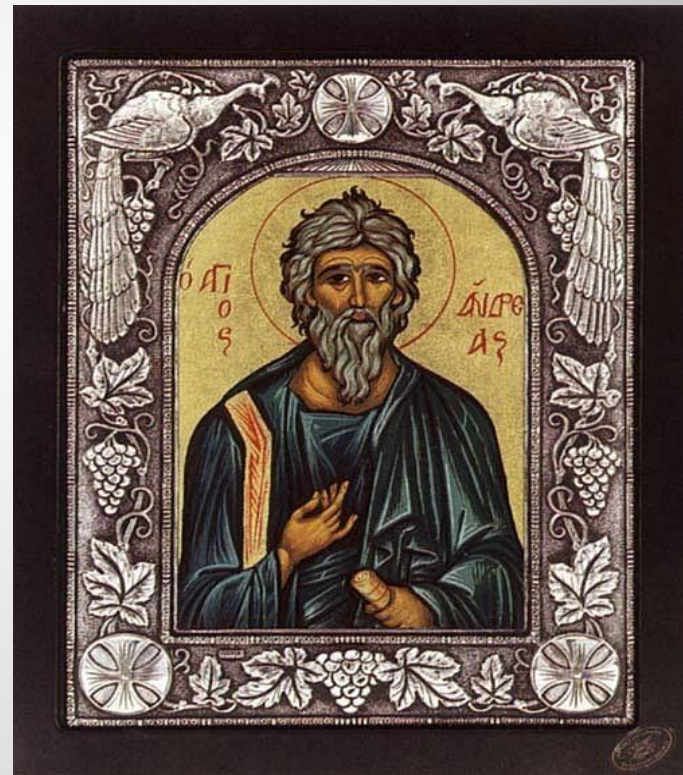
On this day some patriotic Englishmen wear a rose pinned to their jackets,

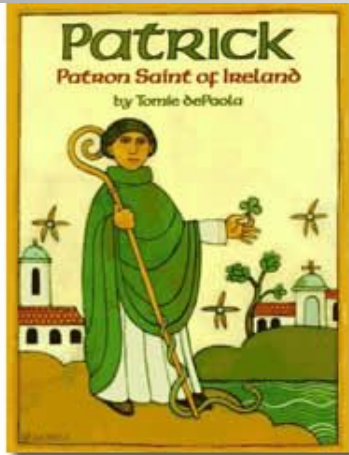
A red rose is the national emblem of England from the time of the Wars of the Roses {15th century}.

St. David

St. David's Day (the 1st of March) is the church festival of St. David, a 6th-century monk and bishop, the patron saint of Wales. The day is regarded as the national holiday of Wales, although it is not an official bank holiday.

On this day, however, many Welshmen wear either a yellow daffodil or a leek pinned to their jackets, as both plants are traditionally regarded as national emblems of Wales.





St. Patrick's Day

St. Patrick's Day (the 17th of March) is considered as a national day in Northern Ireland and an official bank holiday there. Irish people all over the world celebrate St. Patrick's Day in New York, Chicago and Boston in the USA because lots of Irish people live there.
