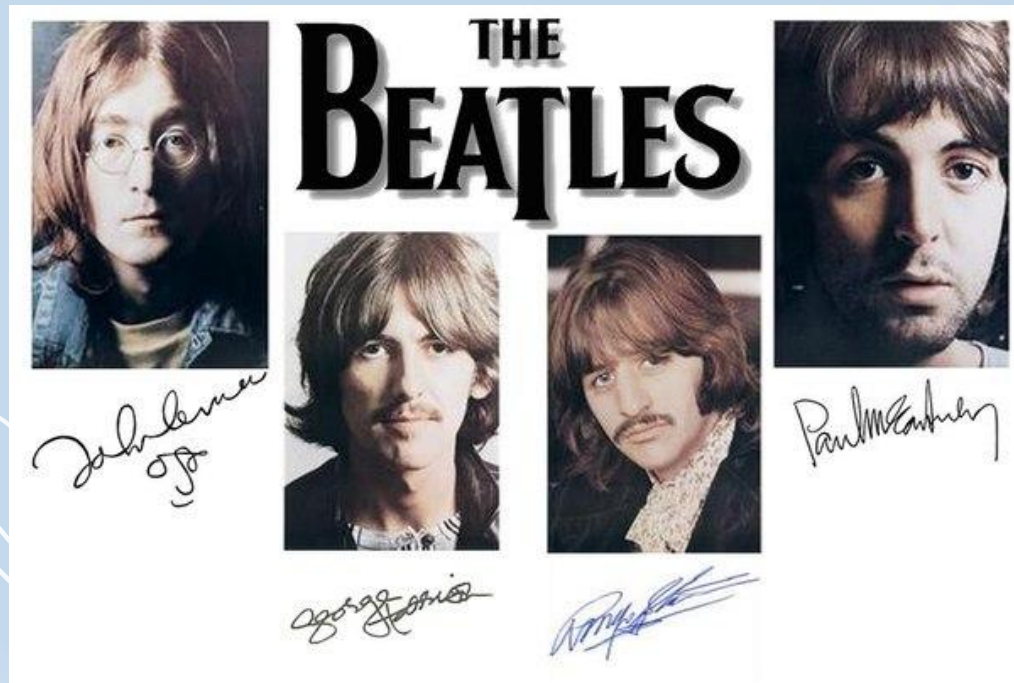

Both - Either - Neither



Both = the two alternatives
= this AND that

Either = one of the two alternatives
= this OR that

Neither = none
= not this AND not the other

BOTH

English

AND

Spanish

I can speak **both** English **and** Spanish.

EITHER

English

OR

Spanish

I can speak **either** English **or** Spanish.
Which is easier for you to understand?

NEITHER

French

NOR

Arabic

I can speak **neither** French **nor** Arabic.

ALL



(total)

We use **ALL** to talk about the **total** number of things considered as a **group** and not individually.

Minimum of three things

ALL is used for the entire amount of something.

All + plural noun

- *All houses need to have a roof.*

ALL can be used to make a generalization.

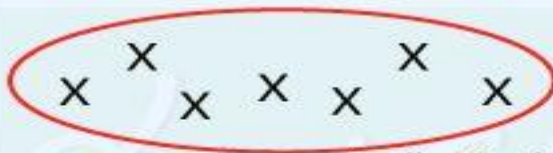
- *All elephants are slow.*

*I say goodbye to **ALL** of the students as they leave the room.*

= "Goodbye students"

(I just say goodbye once)

EVERY



(collectively)

We use **EVERY** to talk about things **collectively** as a **group** more than individually.

Not for two things

EVERY is usually for a large number.

Every + Singular Noun

- *Every house on the street looks the same.*

Can be used for **how often** something happens.

- *I take a break **every** two hours.* (Every + Number + Plural Noun)

*I say goodbye to **EACH** student as they leave the room.*

= "Goodbye Mary" "Goodbye Daniel"...

(I say it to each student individually)

EACH



(one by one)

We use **EACH** to talk about the **individual** members of a group as **separate** items.

For two things or more

EACH is usually for a small number.

Each + Singular Noun

- *Each house on the street has a different number.*

Each of + You/Us/Them

- *She gave **each of us** a small gift.*
