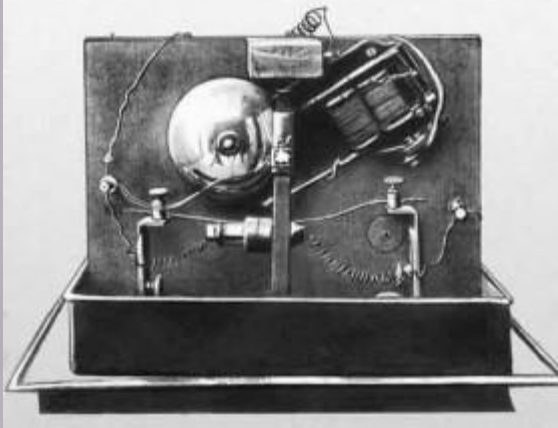

Boston, Thursday Sept. 25th. 1690.

**I**t is desired, that the Country shall be furnished once a month (or if any Glaz of Occurrences happen, oftener,) with an Account of such considerable things as have arrived unto our Notice.

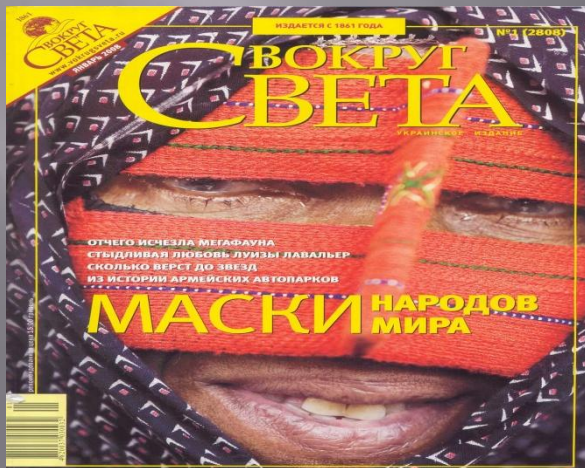
