Learning Style

Learning style is an individual's natural way of acquiring and processing information in learning situations.

One of the most common classification of the various types of learning styles is Fleming's VARK model.

Neil D. Fleming

Neil D. Fleming is a teacher from New Zealand. He has taught in universities, teacher education centers and high schools. Before working for eleven years in faculty development at Lincoln University, he was for nine years a senior inspector for the over 100 high schools in the South Island of New Zealand. This involved being a critical observer of over 9000 'lessons' in classrooms.

VARK

- The Visual – Aural – Read/Write – Kinesthetic learning styles model, usually abbreviated to VARK provides a simple way to explain and understand your own learning style.



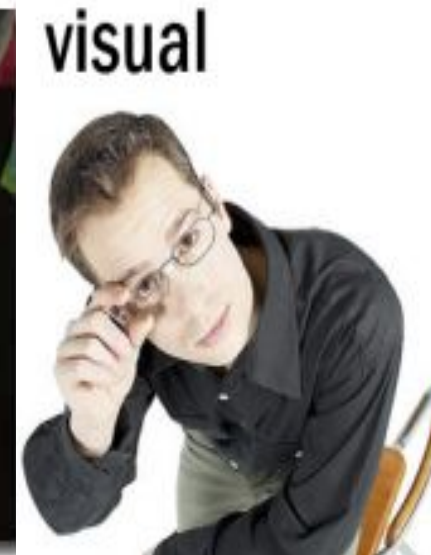
	Visual Learner: Learns best by seeing
	Auditory Learner: Learns best by hearing
	Kinesthetic Learner: Learns best by feeling or experiencing

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Visual learners (V)

- Visual learners have a preference for seeing (think in pictures; visual aids such as overhead slides, diagrams, handouts, maps, graphs).



Aural/Auditory learners (A)

- - best learn through listening (lectures, group discussions, tapes, radio, phones, speaking and web chat).

Aural learners learn most effectively by listening to information delivered orally in lectures, speeches, and oral sessions.

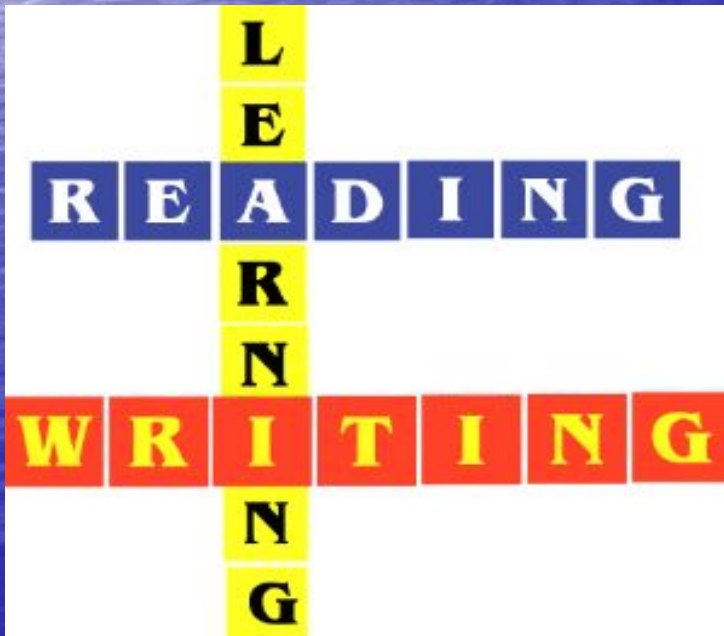

Read/Write learners (R)

- This preference is for information displayed as words. People who prefer this modality are often addicted to Power Point, the Internet, lists, diaries, dictionaries, etc.



Kinesthetic/Tactile learners (K)

- - prefer to learn via experience – moving, touching and doing (active exploration of the world)

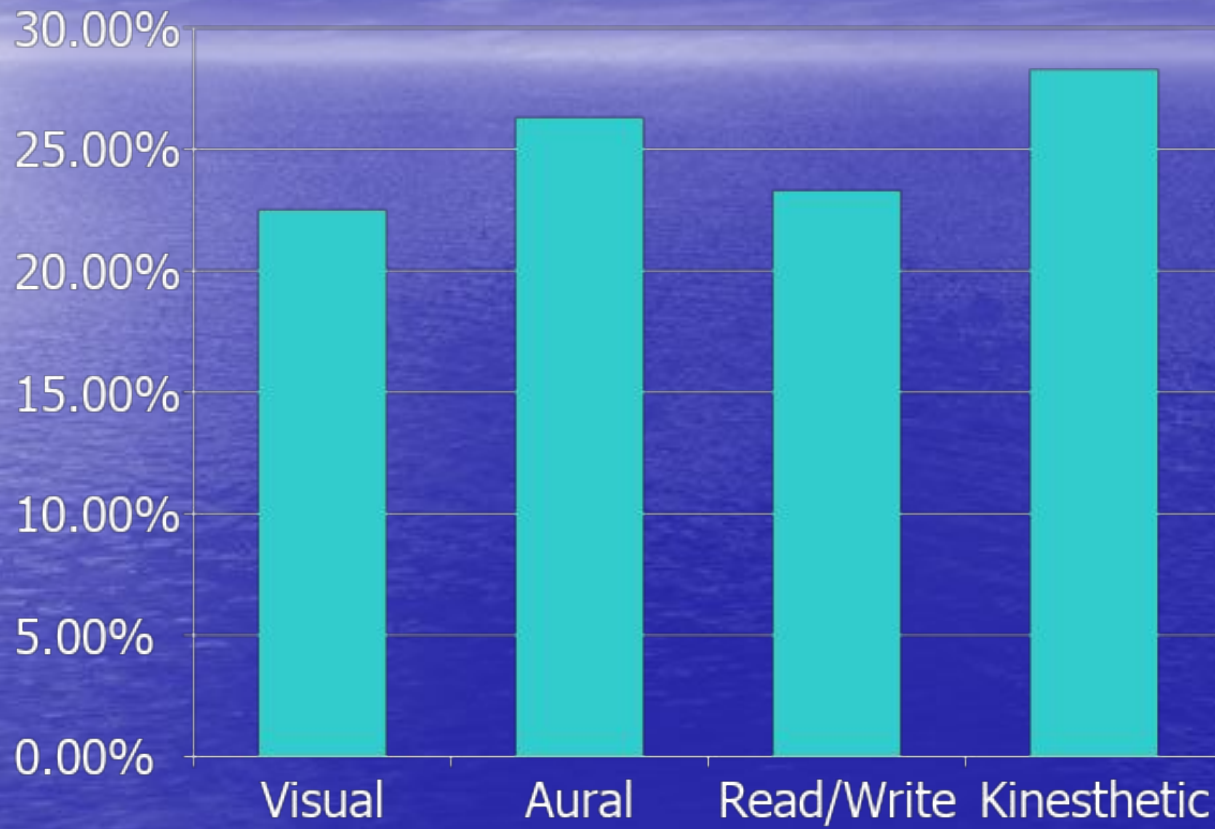
