The judicial brunch of the power is vested in the Supreme Court



- The Supreme Court consists of the Chief Justice and 9 Associate Justices.
- Power to nominate the Justices is vested in the President of the United States, and appointments are made with the advice and consent of the Senate.
- Judges are appointed for life. They hold their Offices during good Behaviour and can be removed by an Impeachment.

Functions

- to explain the law
- to imply the law
- to guard the Constitution



Authorities

- to handle offences against federal laws and treaties
- to disputes among states
- to decide which of the lower court cases it will except for review
- to decide if actions of the legislative and executive brunches of power conform to the Constitution

The S.C. is the highest appellate judicial body of the country



- ► The Supreme Court is in session from October to July
- The decisions of the S.C. are final, but can be superseded by another S.C. decision
