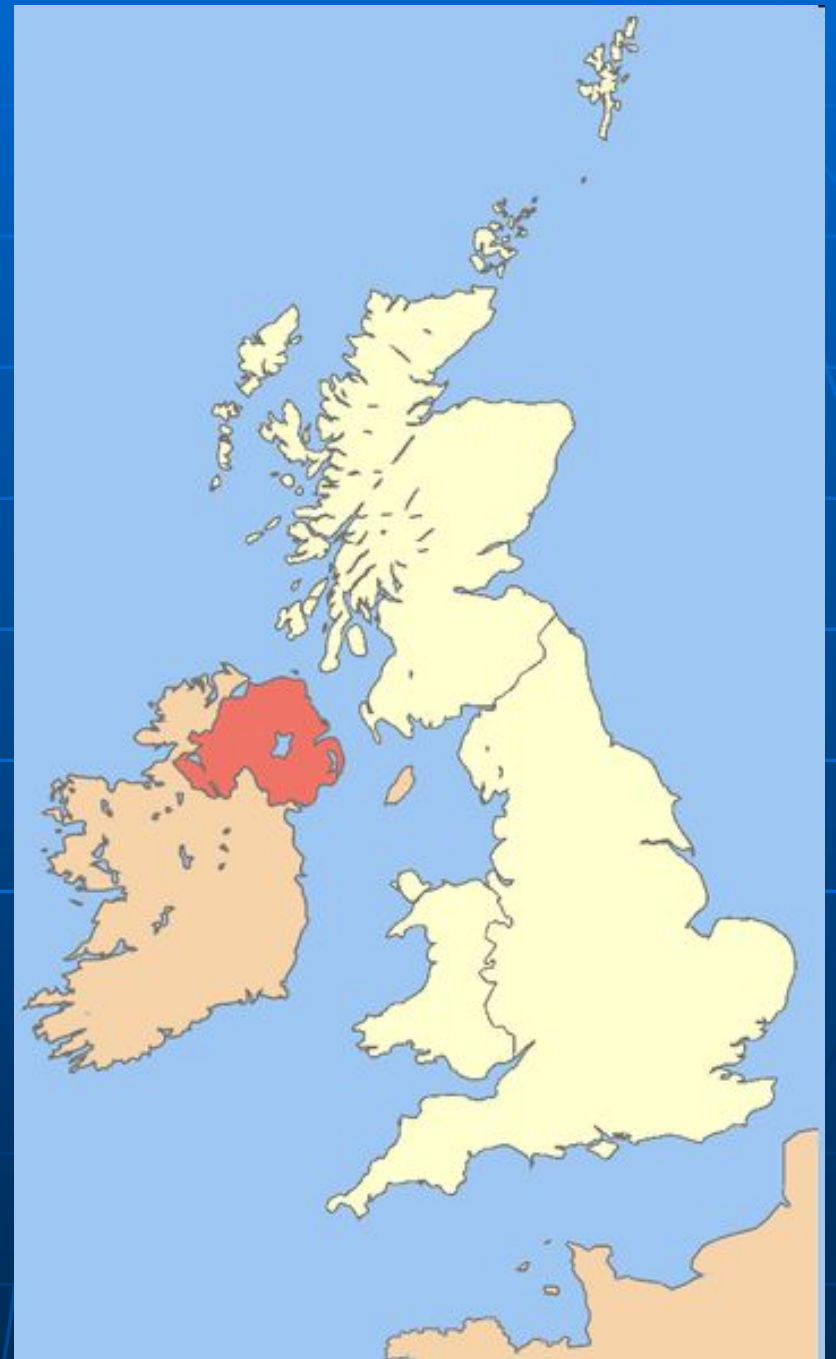

of Ireland;**





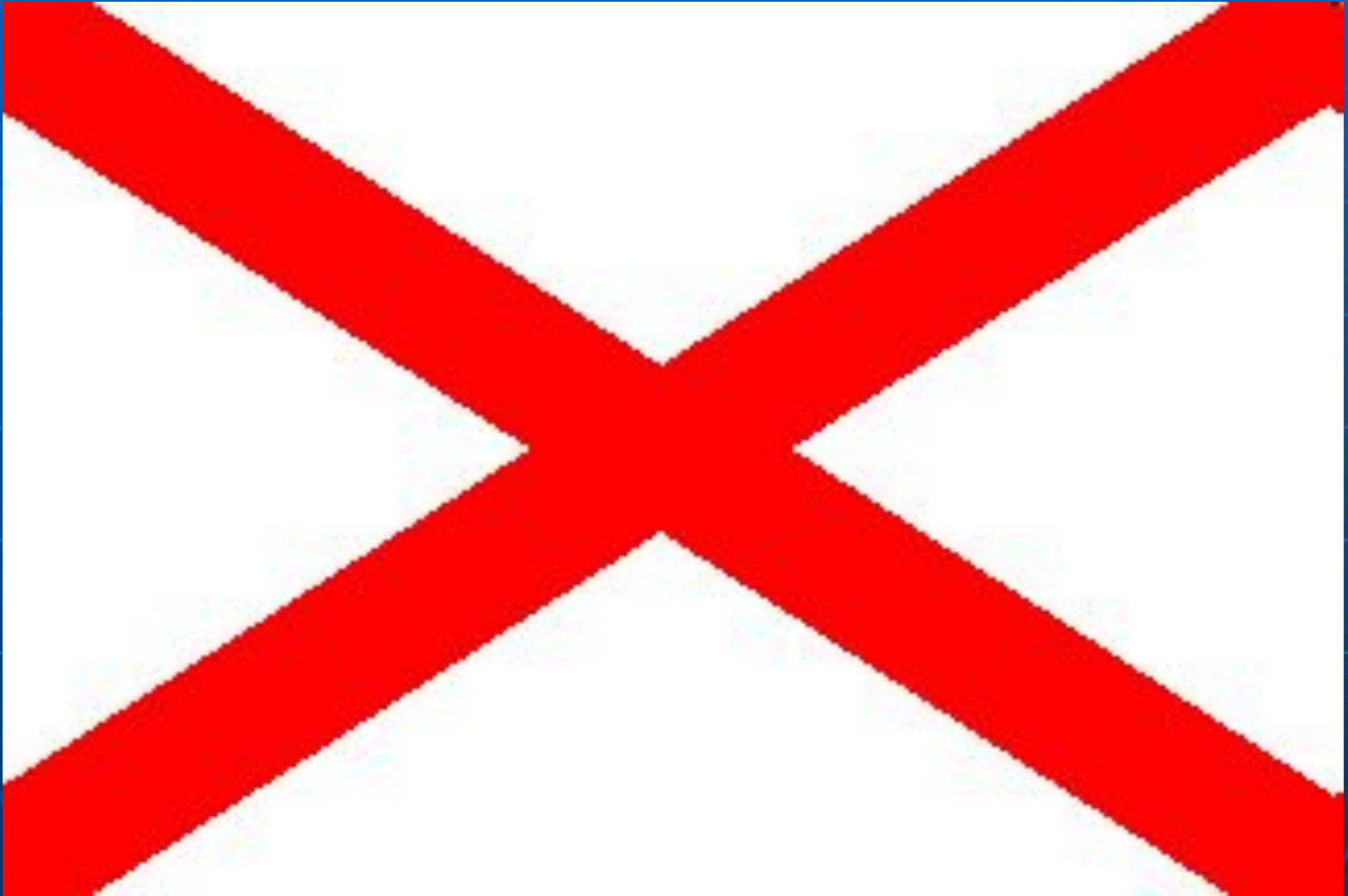
It borders on the Republic of Ireland in the south and west. Its population is about 3% of the population of the United Kingdom.

Map of Northern Ireland, surrounding seas and territory



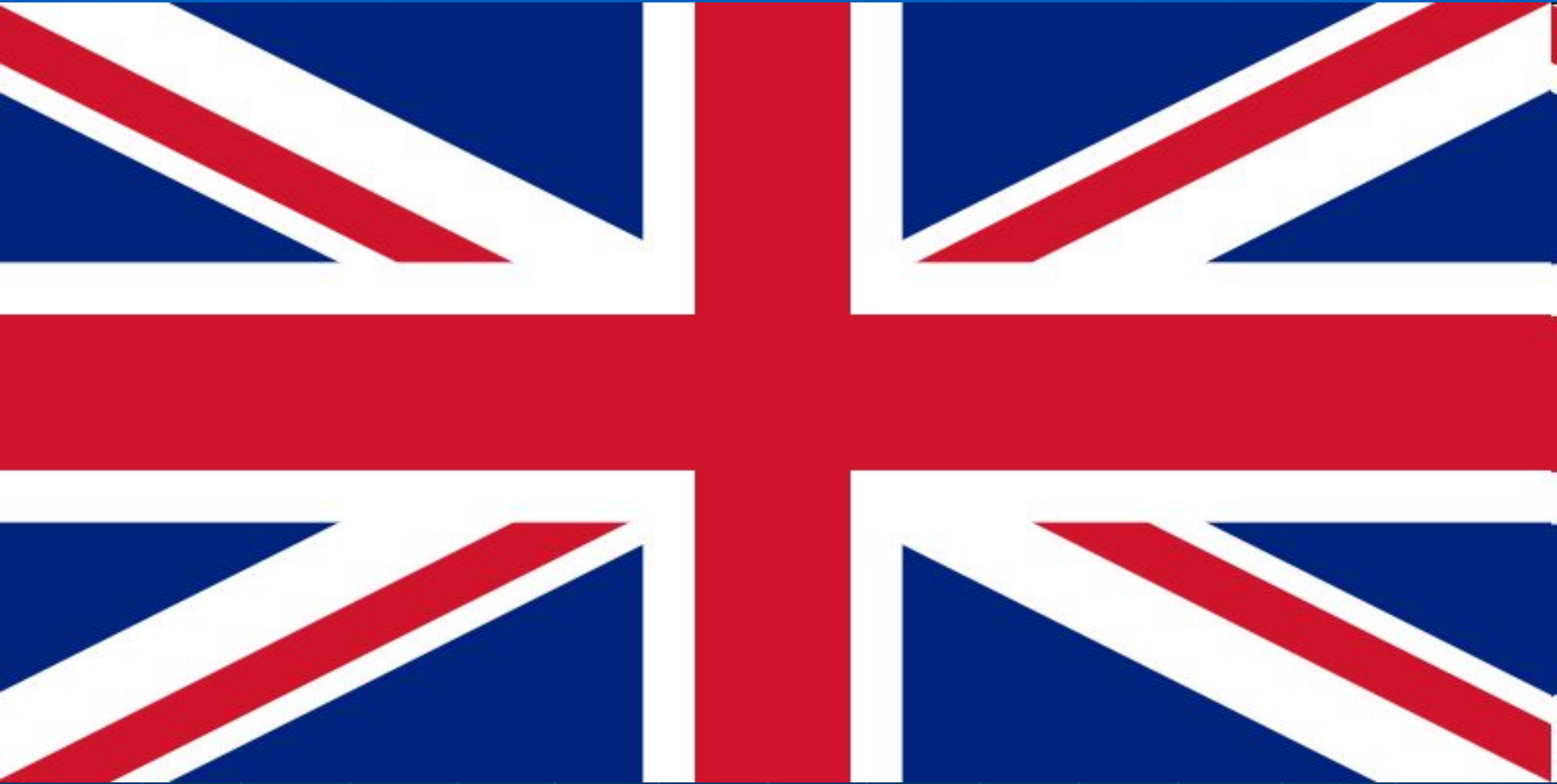
Northern Ireland consists of six of the nine counties of the Irish province of Ulster. It was created as a division of the United Kingdom in May 1921.

Flag of Executive Committee of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland (also known as the Ulster Banner; no official status in Northern Ireland since 1972)



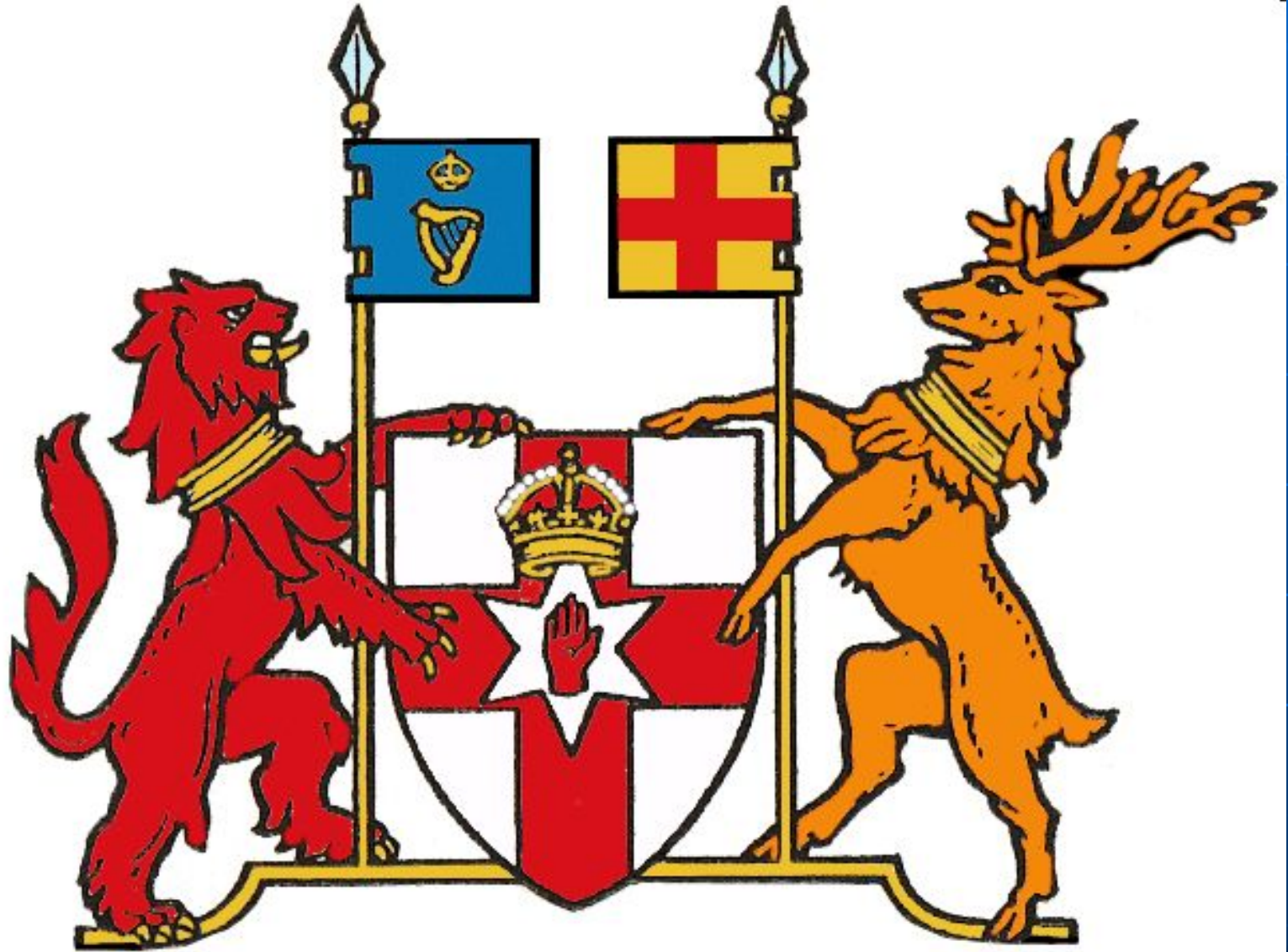

Flag of the Republic of Ireland



The "Flag of Ireland" or "Irish Tricolour" is the national flag of the Republic of Ireland. It is often flown by Republicans and Nationalists to show their support for a united Ireland. It has no official status in Northern Ireland.

Northern Ireland Coat-of-arms



The red right hand on the coat of arms of Northern Ireland makes us think of an Irish legend.
