

General or Yes/No Questions Common questions that can be answered with a simple "yes" or "no" are logically called yes/no questions.

Are you a student? Do you live in Russia? Is it cold outside?

Special or Wh-Questions A special question, as you can guess, uses a certain word at the beginning of the sentence. The questions words who, what, where, when, why, how, how many, etc.

What is your name? Where do you live? Whose books are on the table?

Tag Questions

This type of question is also made up of two parts, where the first part is a positive statement, and the second part is negative, or vice-versa.

She sent him an invitation, didn't she? Jane isn't in France, is she? Our dad will come soon, won't he?

Alternative Questions This type of questions present two or more alternatives, as in "Do you want fish or lamb?" They cannot be answered with yes or no.

Shall we go train or by bus? Do you like apricots or peaches? Has he got Mercedes or BMW?
