- In the Republic of Ireland, under the Constitution of Ireland, both languages have official status.
- A growing number of pupils are through Irish and English.
- Most Irish can speak at least two languages.







INTERESTING THINGS ABOUT GAELIC (The Irish Language) Gaeilge

- Gaeilge, Irish, or “Irish Gaelic” is the national and first official language of Ireland, as well as one of the official languages of the European Union.
- When we say Irish (the language) we don’t mean our accent in English – we mean a language on a completely different branch of the European language family tree.



Irish to be given full official EU language status in 2016

Though it has been an official language of the EU since 2007, Irish will now be gradually upgraded to a full working language of the European institutions.
