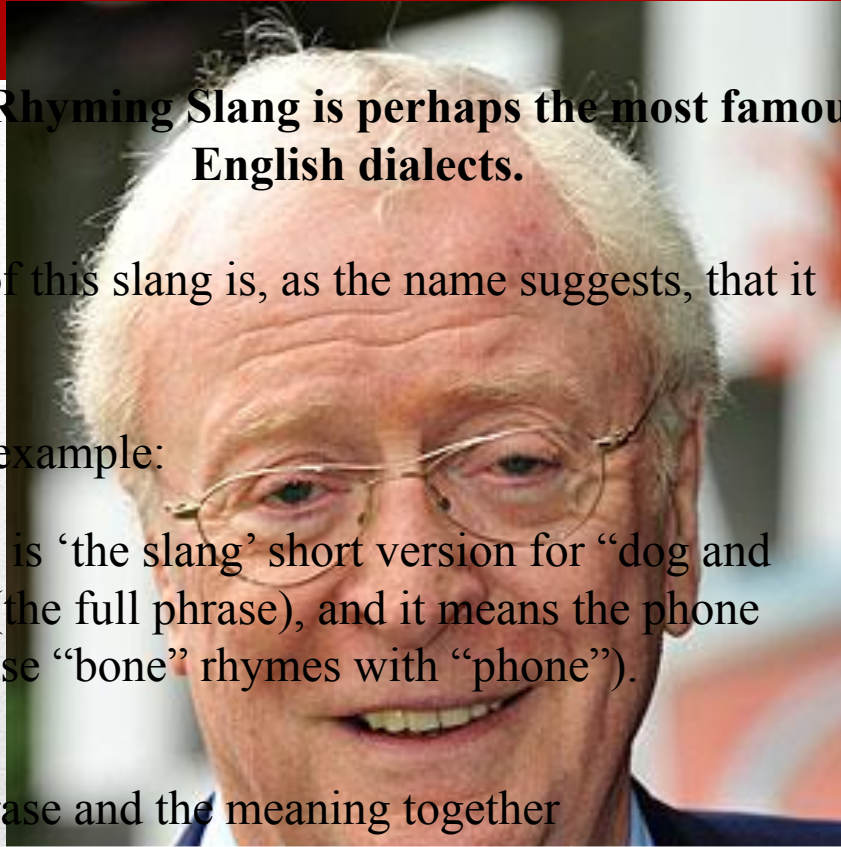


**Cockney Rhyming Slang is perhaps the most famous of English dialects.**

The basis of this slang is, as the name suggests, that it rhymes.

Here is an example:

“dog” is ‘the slang’ short version for “dog and bone”(the full phrase), and it means the phone (because “bone” rhymes with “phone”).
