- General or scientific facts and definitions
- Instructions in situations

Present Simple

• If I have a cold, I (usually/always) stay at home.

• If you feel tired, have a rest.

Real Condition

- Possible situations in present or future and their results in present or future

Conditional I

Subordinate Clause

If + Present Simple/
Continuous/Perfect/
Perfect Continuous

Main Clause

Future Simple

- If we miss a bus, we will be late.
- If you ride your bike like that, you will fall off!
- If you have revised properly, you won't have any problems in the test tomorrow.

Real/Unreal Condition

Conjunctions

- Conditional sentences may be introduced by the conjunctions:

if,
in case,
as/so long as,
provided (that),
unless,
suppose.

Word or Phrase	Meaning
unless	'except if' or 'if... not'
in case	'because s/he/it/etc might'
as/so long as	'if' or 'only if'
provided (that)	'if' or 'only if'

Example
I'll be there at six unless I get delayed. (=except if I get delayed/if I don't get delayed)
Let's take our willies in case it's muddy (= because it might be muddy)
As long as I'm happy, my parents don't care what job I do.
So long as I'm happy, my parents don't care what job I do.
Provided (that) I'm happy, my parents don't care what job I do.

should

• If I knew the answer, I would tell you.

• If I were a rock star, I would (I'd) live in New York.

Unreal Condition

Conditional II

Main Clause

would/could/should
+ have + Participle II

- If you had asked me, I would have helped you.
- If she 'd been wearing her new glasses, I would have noticed them.

Revision
