Rouge” in 1697.





Little Red Riding Hood became popular with English language readers in the middle of the 19th century when the fairy tales of the Brothers Grimm took Victorian England by storm.



The puzzle is why the girl's name is "Little Red Riding Hood", not "cap" or "hat", in English variant.

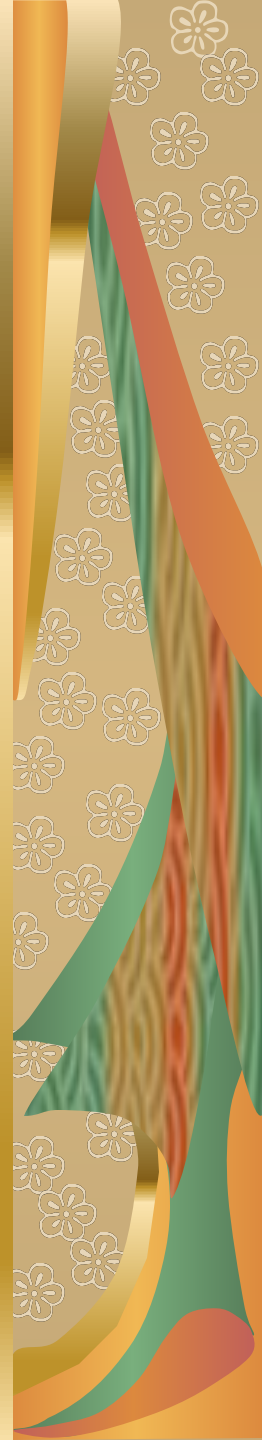
