### Dogs have 42 teeth, <u>cats</u> have 30 teeth, pigs have 44 teeth, and an armadillo has 104 teeth.



### A snail's mouth is no larger than the head of a pin, but it can have over 25,000 teeth!



#### The <u>Blue</u> Whale is the largest mammal on earth, but it eats only tiny shrimp because it has no teeth.



George Washington never had wooden teeth. His dentures were made from gold, hippopotamus tusk, <u>elephant</u> ivory and human teeth!



### Ancient <u>Greeks</u> used pumice, talc, alabaster, coral powder or iron rust as toothpaste.



#### Teeth are marvelous equipment, but you have to take <u>care</u> of them.



People who drink 3 or more glasses of soda each day have 62% more tooth decay, fillings and tooth loss than others. Put down the pop and sports drinks and pick up some nice fresh <u>water</u> instead.



The average woman smiles 62 times a day. The average man smiles about 8 times a day.

Kids laugh around 400 times a day, adults just 15 times a day.



The most valuable tooth belonged to Sir Isaac Newton . In 1816 one of his teeth was sold in London for \$3,633, or in today's terms \$35,700.

The tooth was set in a ring!



### The first teeth we get as babies are called <u>milk</u> teeth, primary teeth, or baby teeth.



Once the first tooth comes in, more quickly begin to appear. Most kids have a full set of teeth by the age of three. There are 20 teeth total in this first \_\_\_\_\_.



## When children are around 5 or 6 years old, their teeth start to \_\_\_fall\_\_ out one by one.



# Losing a tooth can be scary at first, but there's a reasonable explanation – the milk teeth are pushed out by <a href="mailto:permanent">permanent</a> teeth growing in.



You have more permanent teeth than milk teeth: 32 in all. The four wisdom teeth are the last to come in, usually between the ages of 17 and 25. Some people never grow <u>wisdom</u> teeth.



#### Don't forget to floss! If you don't floss, you miss cleaning \_\_40\_% of your tooth surfaces.



Kids in prehistoric times likely did not suffer with tooth decay. The American Dental Association says this is because <a href="mailto:sugar">sugar</a> was not a part of their diet.



Tooth enamel is the strongest substance in the human body; because it's so durable, healthy tooth enamel protects teeth from cavity-causing oral <u>bacteria</u>.



Teeth contain stem cells. In fact, some researchers are using dental stem cells to regrow human <u>teeth</u>. If successful, this technology would mean we can biologically replace lost adult teeth for the first time in history.



Unlike bones or other parts of the body, teeth are incapable of self-repair. This is why receiving fillings and other dental work is necessary to protect teeth from further \_\_damage\_\_.



Tooth decay is actually classified as an infectious disease because it is caused by a particular strain of bacteria passed between multiple people.



### Luckily our modern culture affords us easy access to dental hygiene tools and quality dental <u>care</u>.
