Biography

Alexander Shibayev started practicing table tennis at age seven. First coach - Valentin Fedoseyev. At the beginning of his professional career he played for Yaroslavl table tennis club "Tempo", is currently the club's player of table tennis "UMMC" from Upper Pyshma Sverdlovsk region. He played for Yaroslavl, Sverdlovsk region and Tatarstan.

At present (2016 data) trains in Eslëv in Sweden under the leadership of coach Peter Sartsa (Peter Sartz), coached the national teams of Sweden and Denmark, who previously worked with Michael Mace

Thanks to successful performance in major competitions in 200 Graces the 28 best players of the world and received the right to perform at the Olympic Games 2012 in London. At the Olympic Games in London, Alexander Shibayev eliminated in the third round of the competition, losing with a score of 3: 4 Croatian athlete Andrey Ghachine.

In April 2016 the European Olympic qualification Shibayev Alexander won the right to participate in the Summer Olympics in 2016, however, losing in the third round with a score of 3: 4 Timo Boll, was eliminated from the competition.
