





New Zealand





In fact, New Zealand is one of the least populated countries in the world. A little more than 4 million people live there.


Lake Taupo in the centre of the North Island is the largest lake in New Zealand. It was created by the most violent volcanic eruption the world has ever seen. It was so big that its ashes reached China and Europe.

And there are pools of natural hot water where you can swim. Near here is the Lady Knox geyser, which can shoot water 20 metres into the air.
