(1789 - 1797)

The first president

G.W.:

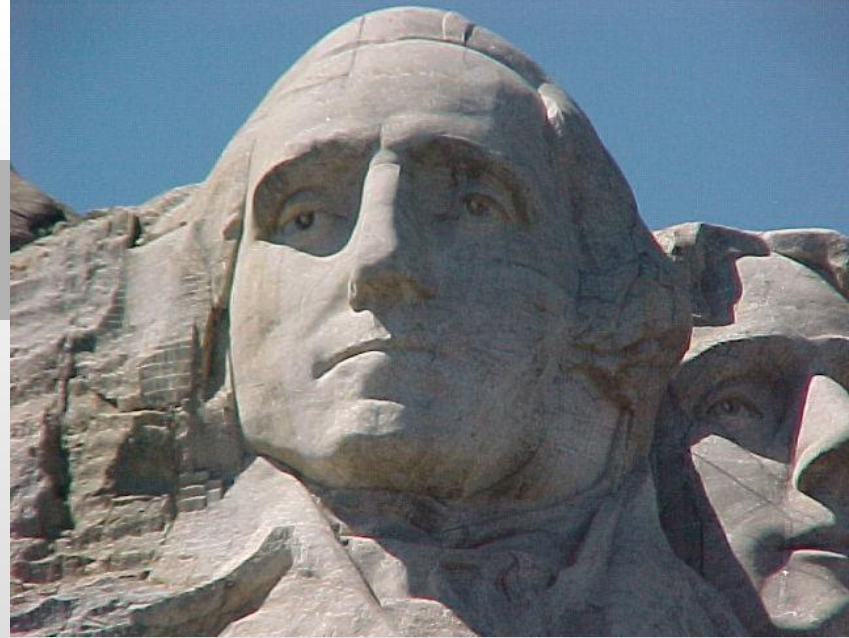
*“As the first of everything, in our situation

**George Washington set a

Born in 1732

Into a Virginia planter family

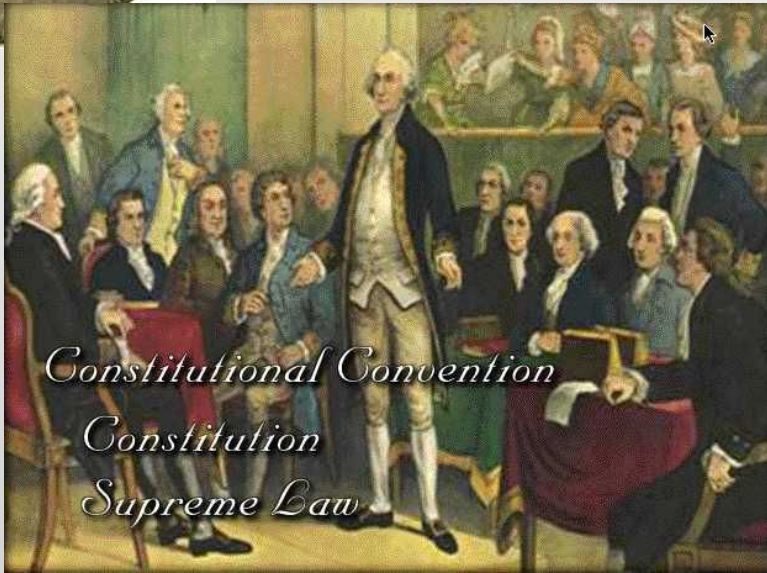


He pursued 2 interests:

- military arts*
- Western expressions*



From 1759 to the outbreak of the American Revolution, Washington managed his lands around Mount Vernon and served in the Virginia House of Burgesses.



He soon realized that the Nation under its Articles of Confederation was not functioning well, so he became a prime mover in the steps leading to the Constitutional Convention at Philadelphia in 1787.

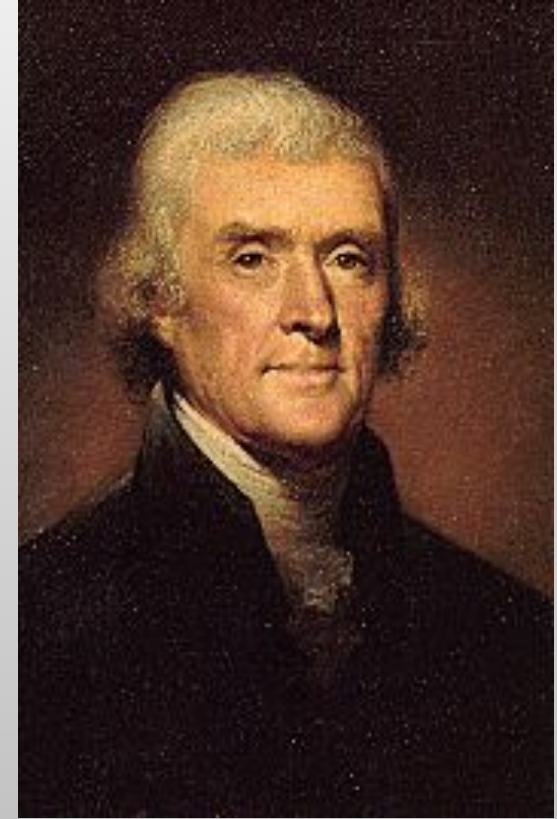
Thomas Jefferson

(1801 – 1809)

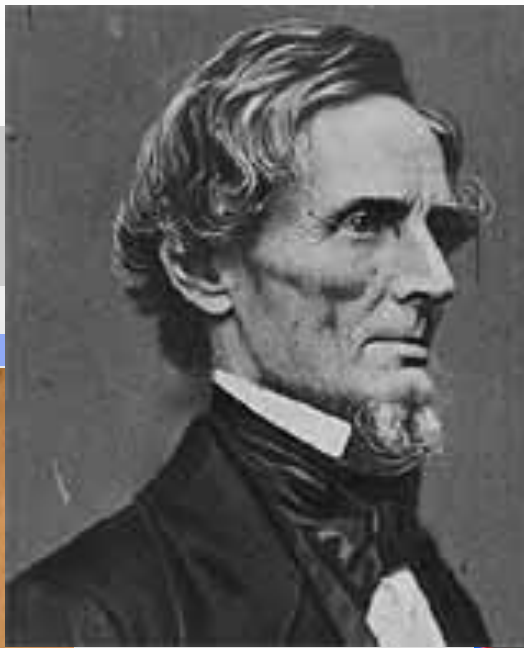
The third president

*During Jefferson's second term,
he was increasingly preoccupied with keeping the*

of civil war.*

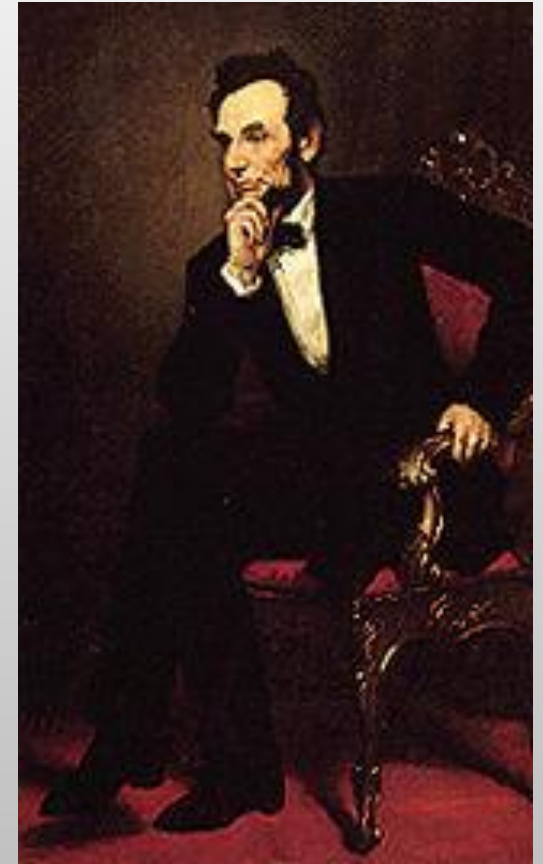

Lincoln had to struggle for a living and for learning.*

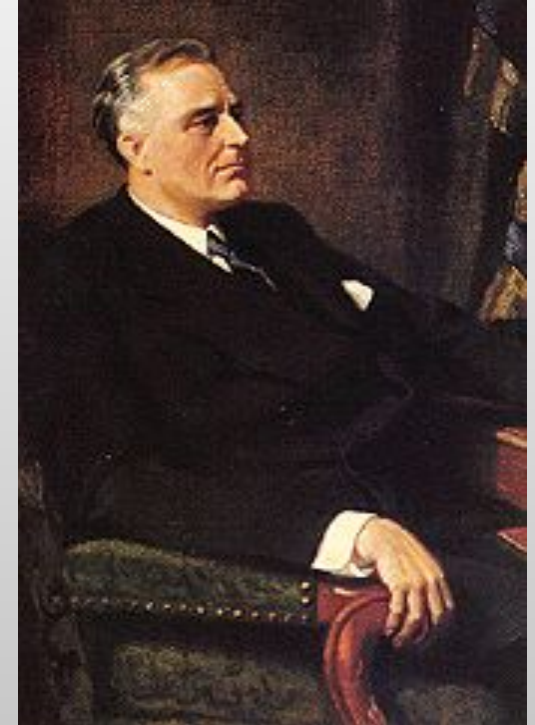


Franklin Delano Roosevelt

(1933 - 1945)

The 32d president

Roosevelt had pledged the United States to the "good neighbor" policy, transforming the Monroe Doctrine from a unilateral American manifesto into arrangements for mutual action against aggressors.



Roosevelt brought hope as he promised prompt, vigorous action, and asserted in his Inaugural Address, "the only thing we have to fear is fear itself"

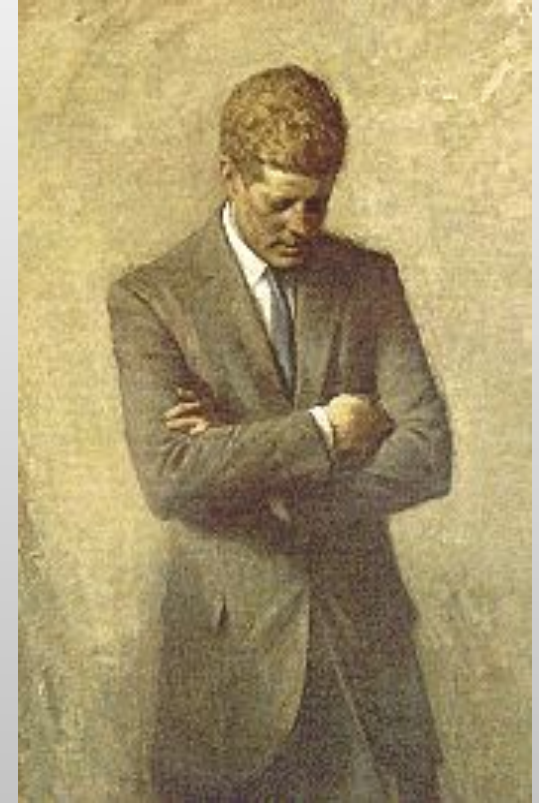


John Fitzgerald Kennedy

The 35th president

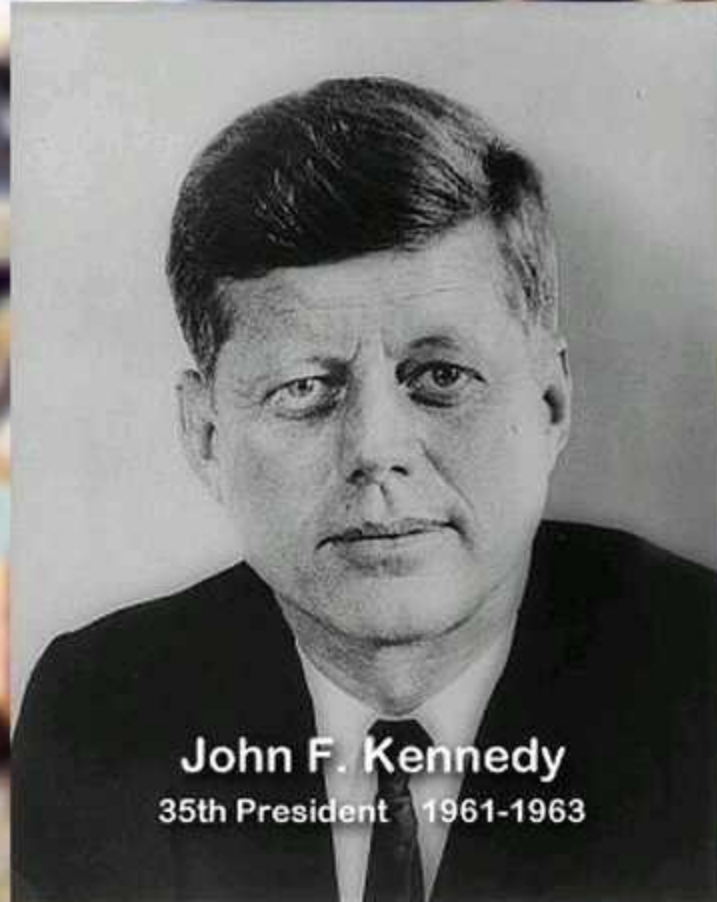
*He wished America to resume its old mission

Texas.*

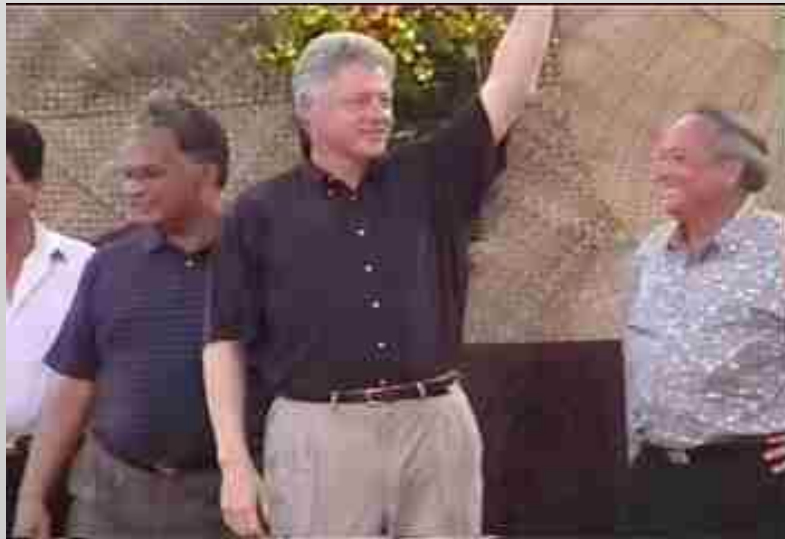


William Jefferson Clinton

(1993 - 2001)

The 42d president

He was the first Democratic president since Franklin D. Roosevelt to win a second term.



During the administration of William J. Clinton, the U.S. enjoyed more peace and economic well being than at any time in its history



he successfully dispatched peace keeping forces to war-torn Bosnia and bombed Iraq when Saddam Hussein stopped United Nations inspections for evidence of nuclear, chemical, and biological weapons.



He proposed the first balanced budget in decades and achieved a budget surplus.







In 1998, as a result of issues surrounding personal indiscretions with a young woman White House intern, Clinton was the second U.S. president to be impeached by the House of Representatives.

He is the first African American to hold the office. Obama previously served as a United States Senator from Illinois, from January 2005 until he resigned following his victory in the 2008 presidential election.



In October 2009, Obama was named the 2009 Nobel Peace Prize laureate.
