


William Makepeace Thackeray was born on 18th July 1811 in Calcutta, India






At the age of 5 he was taken to England after the death of his father and his school-years were not happy ones.







He went to Trinity College, Cambridge, where he made a lot of friends, but left without a degree. He visited Paris a lot and built up large gambling debts. On coming of age (21) he inherited a good fortune which made him independent and able to pay off his debts. But, unfortunately, a few years later the bank holding his money failed, and he was left penniless and needed to earn a living.




Isabella Gethin

After 1840 the mental health of Isabella began to deteriorate and she eventually had to be put into full-time care. This meant that in fact he had no wife but he could not re-marry.




He formed a few attachments to other women, but the exact nature of these is not known with any certainty.




He had some natural ability as an artist, and attended art schools in London and Paris, but it was his writing that proved to be the only thing from which he could make a living.






He died on 23rd December 1863 in London, aged 53.
