2. The Architecture of Roman provinces

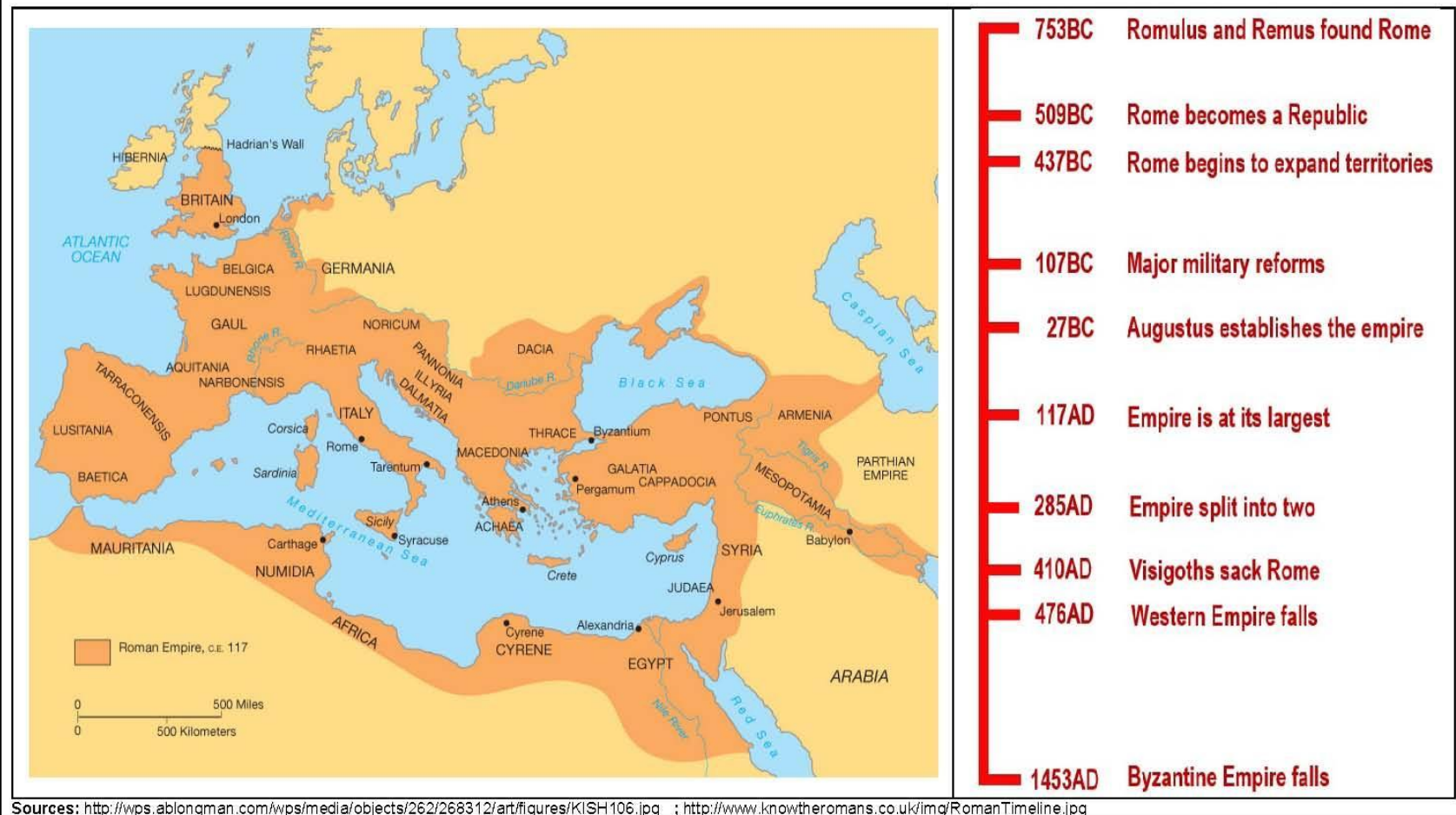
Themes of abstracts (16 pages, 40 000 characters, A4 format):

3. The evolution of the Roman Architecture in the Empire's period

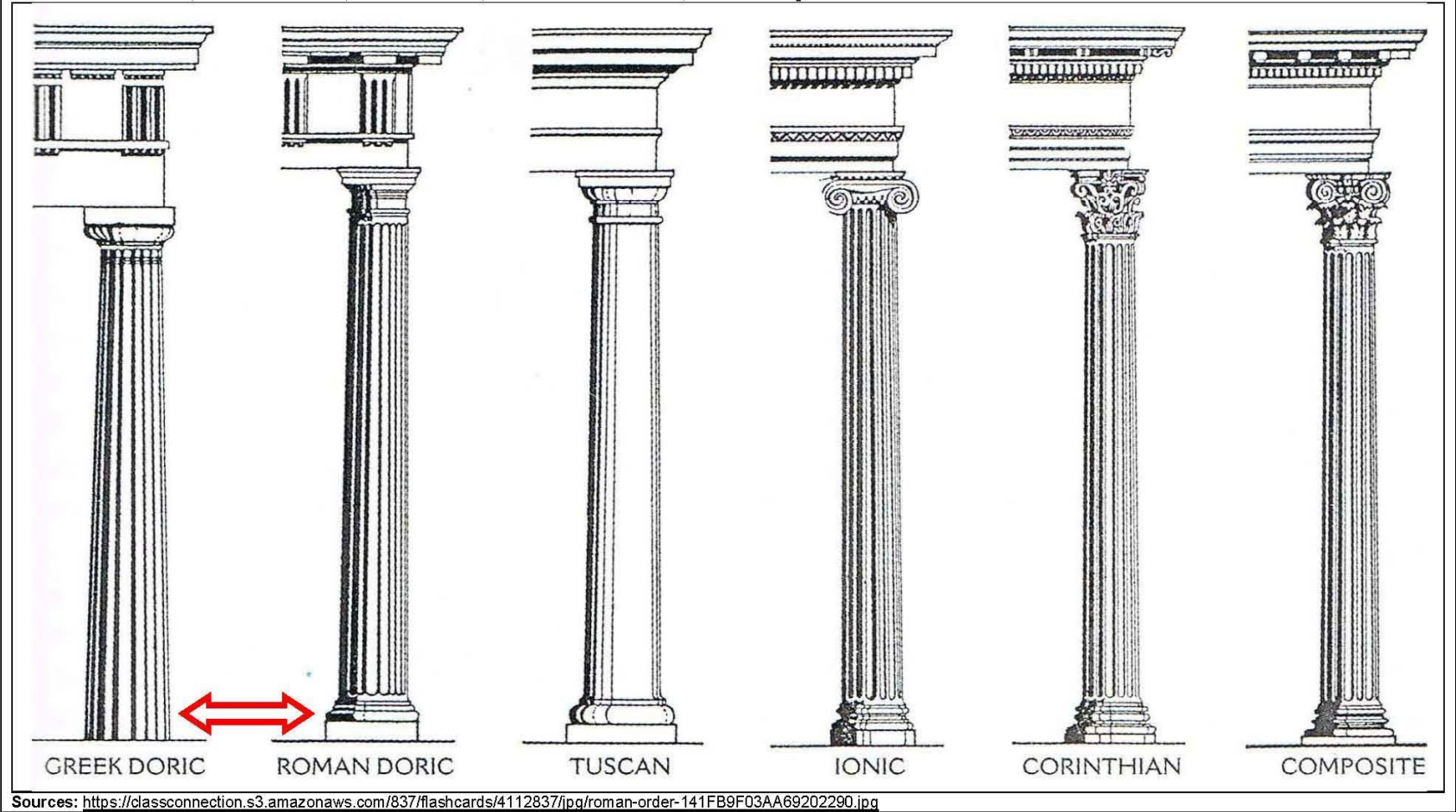

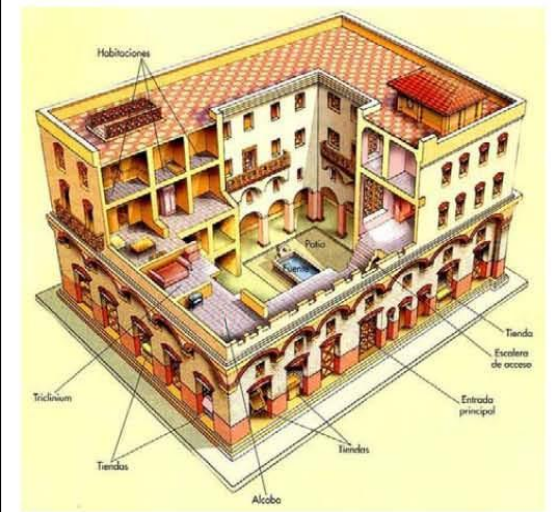
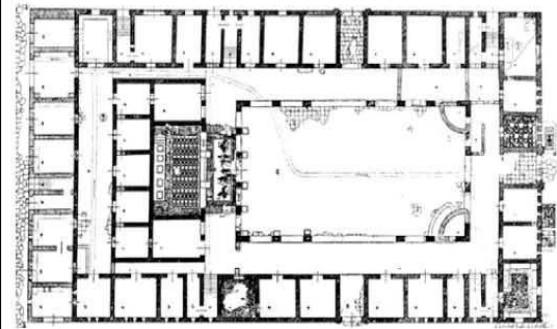
6.1 The Ancient Rome: the Geographical position and the Time-line



6.2 Five Roman orders: a Doric, a Tuscan, an Ionic, a Corinthian, a Composite

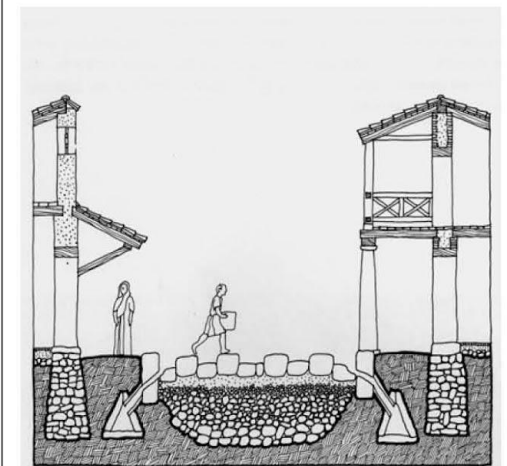
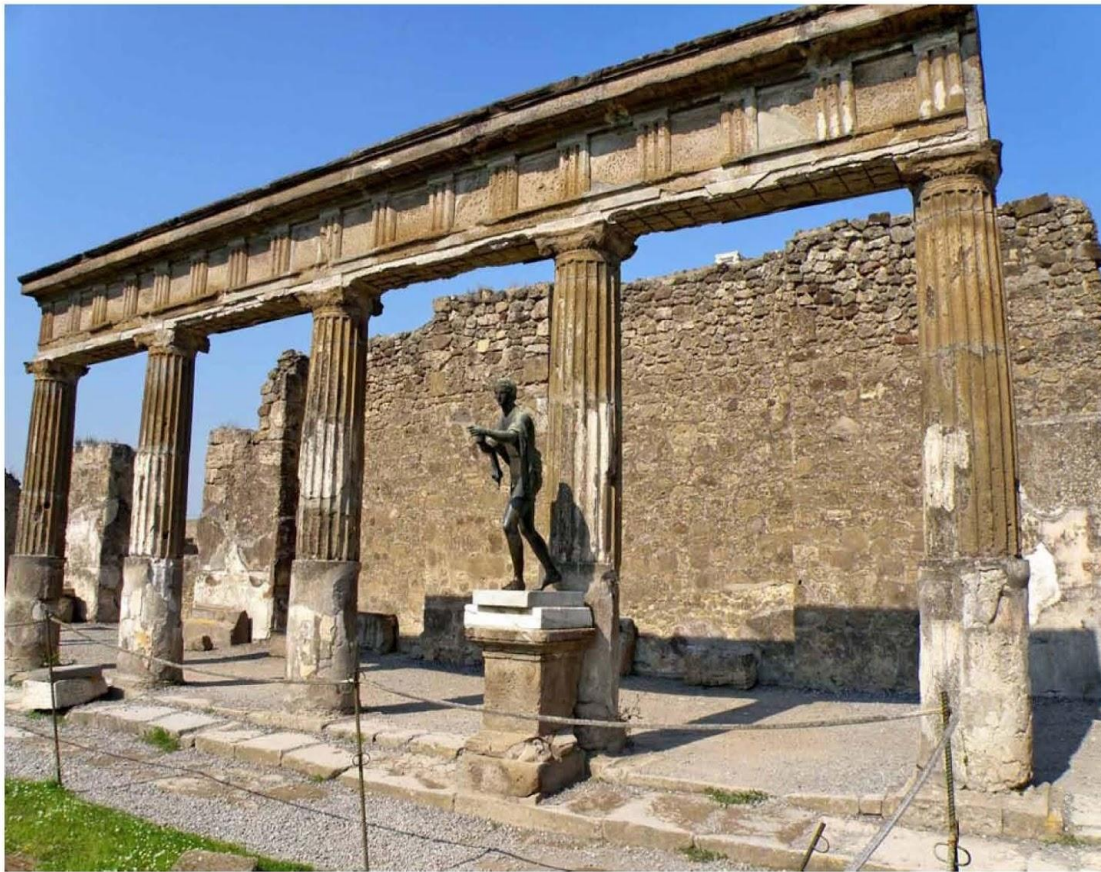


6.3 The Insula (a Multi-storey residential building with rooms and apartments for rental), Rome, from 3rd century BC



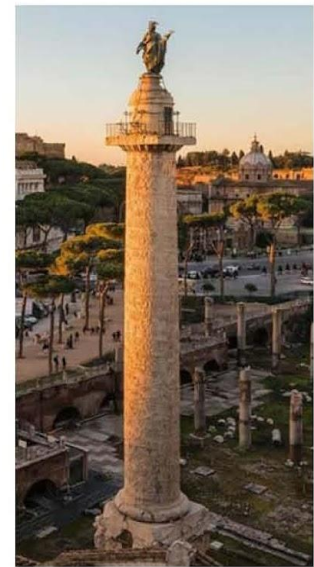
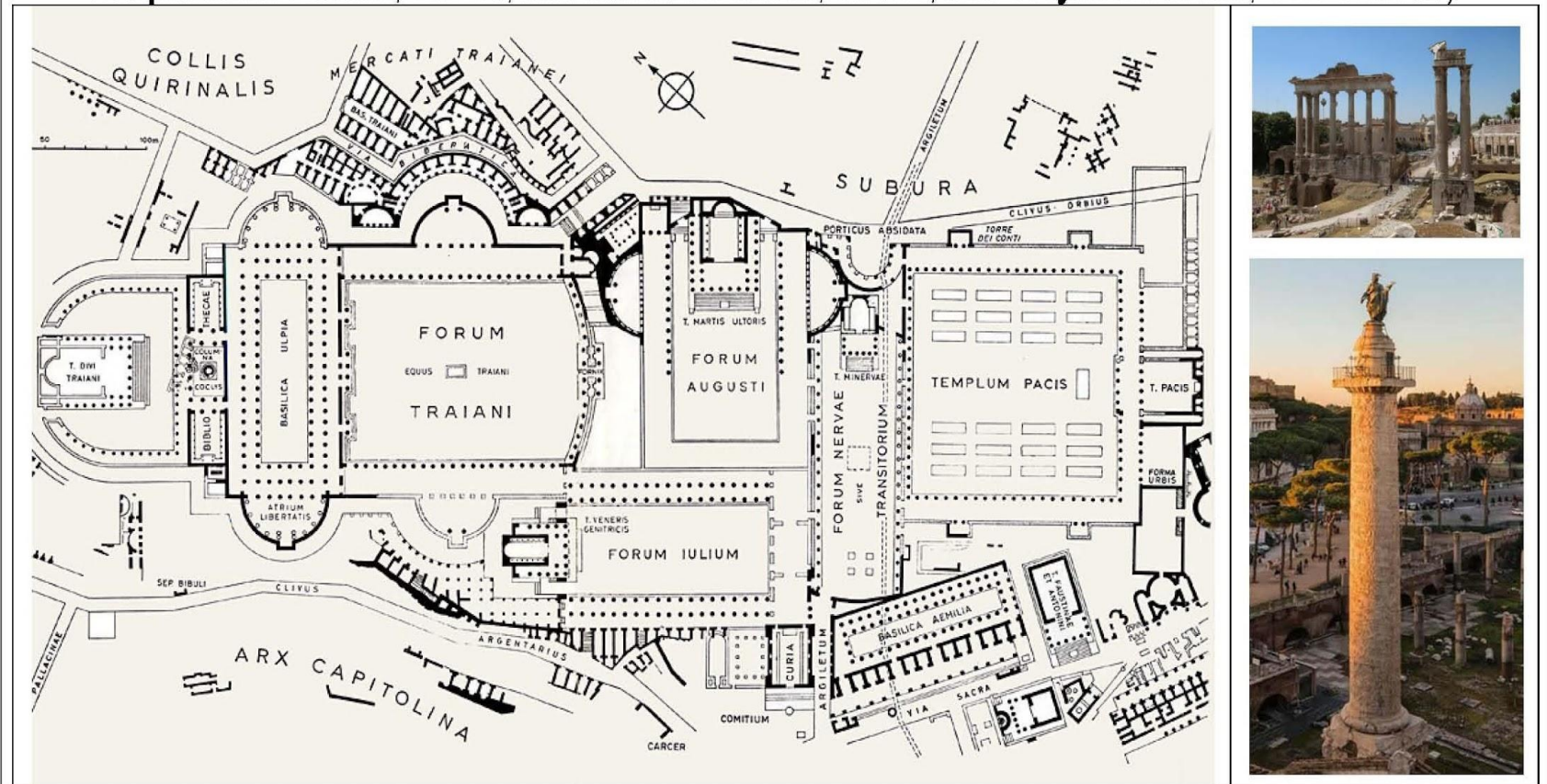

6.4 The Pompeii town, founded 6th – 7th century BC - abandoned 79 AD



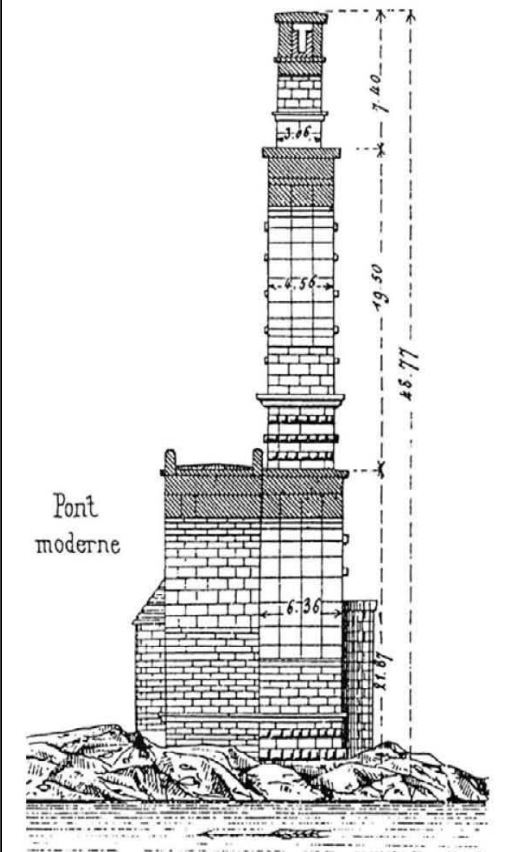

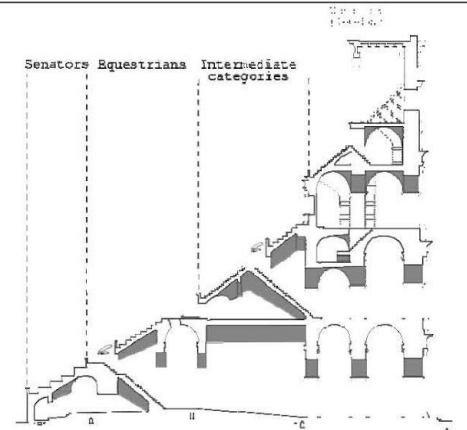

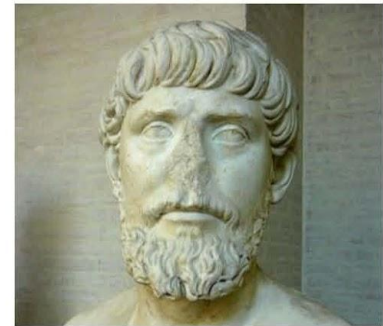

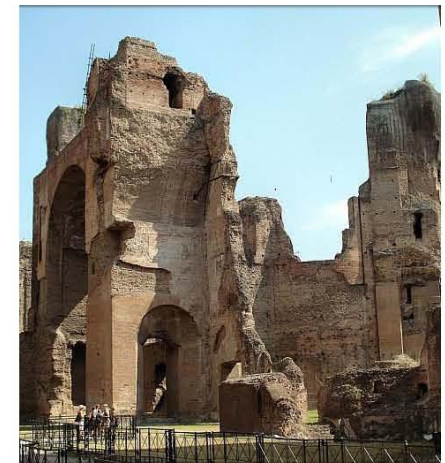
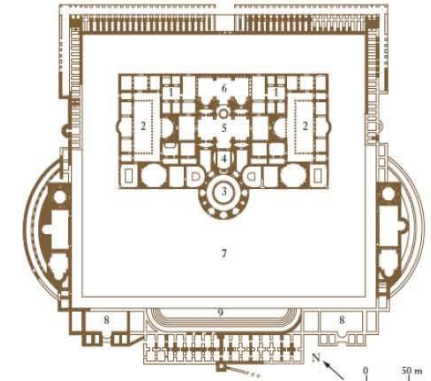
