

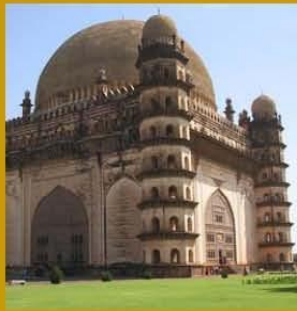
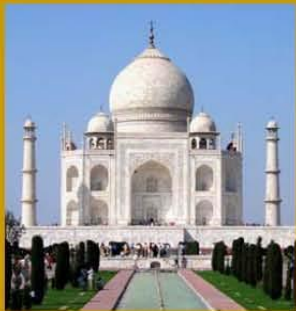

Purpose of the 10th Lecture:

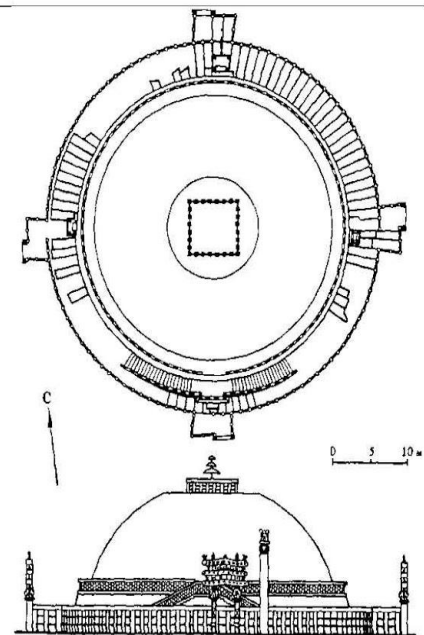

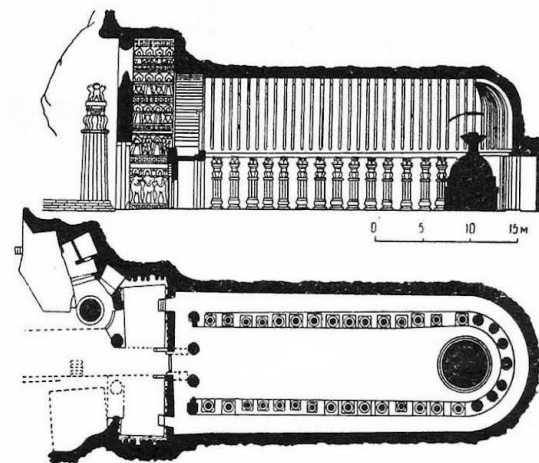

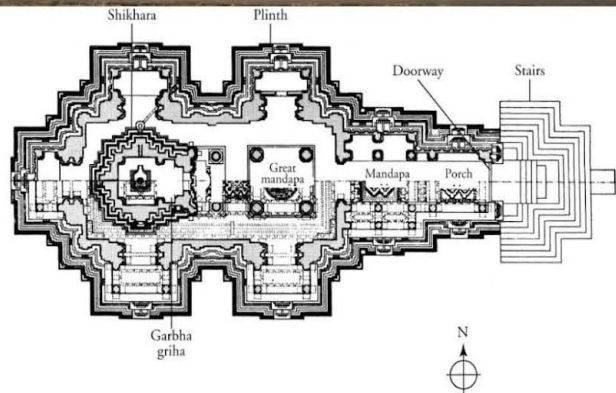

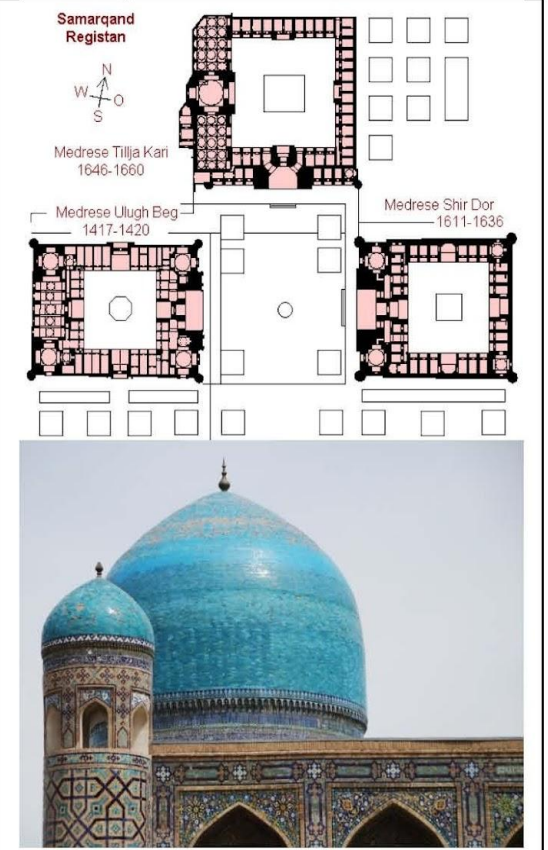

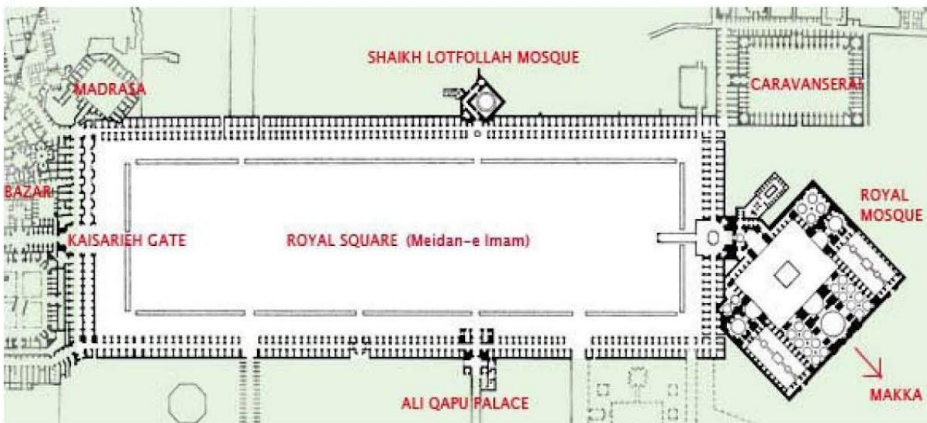
