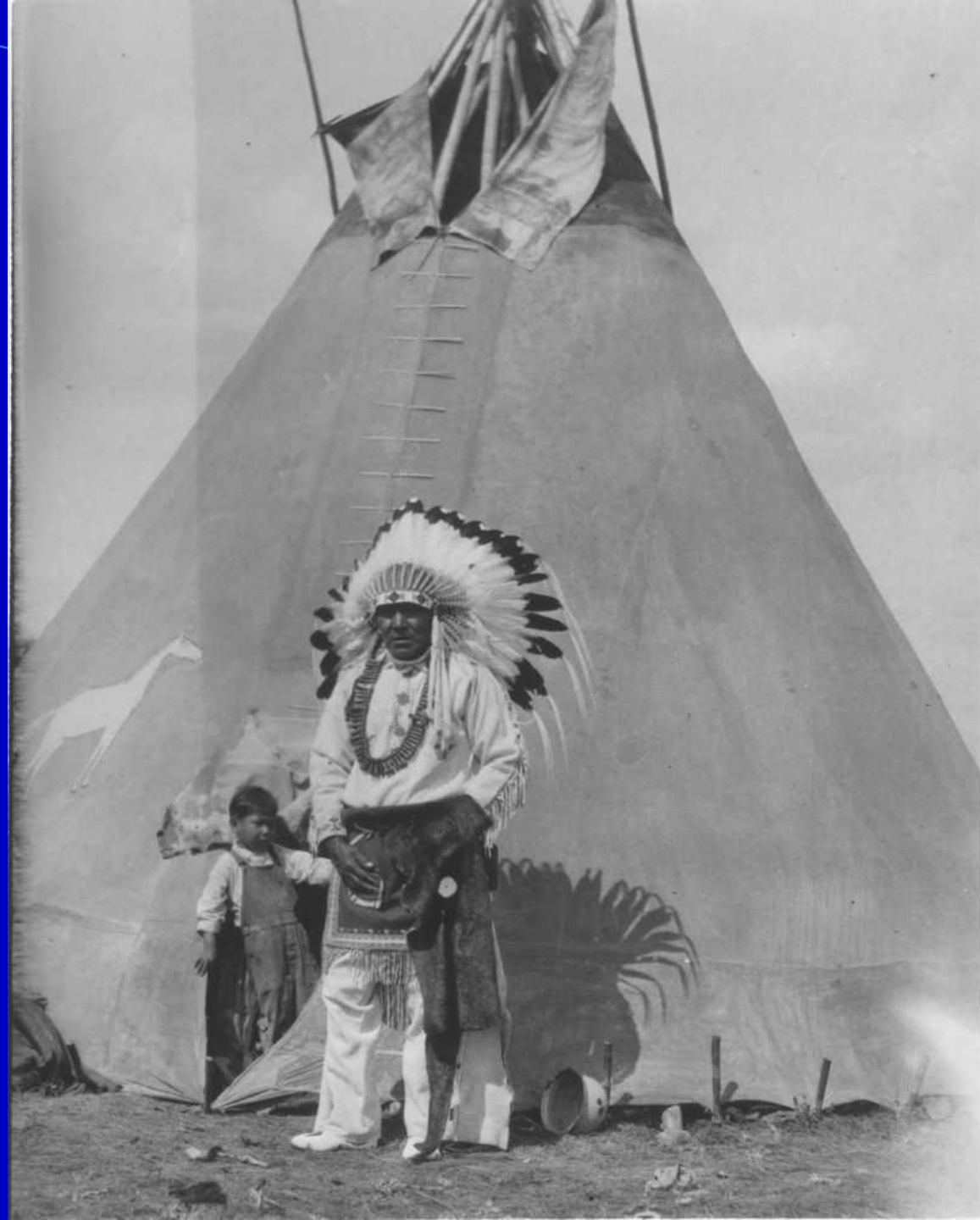






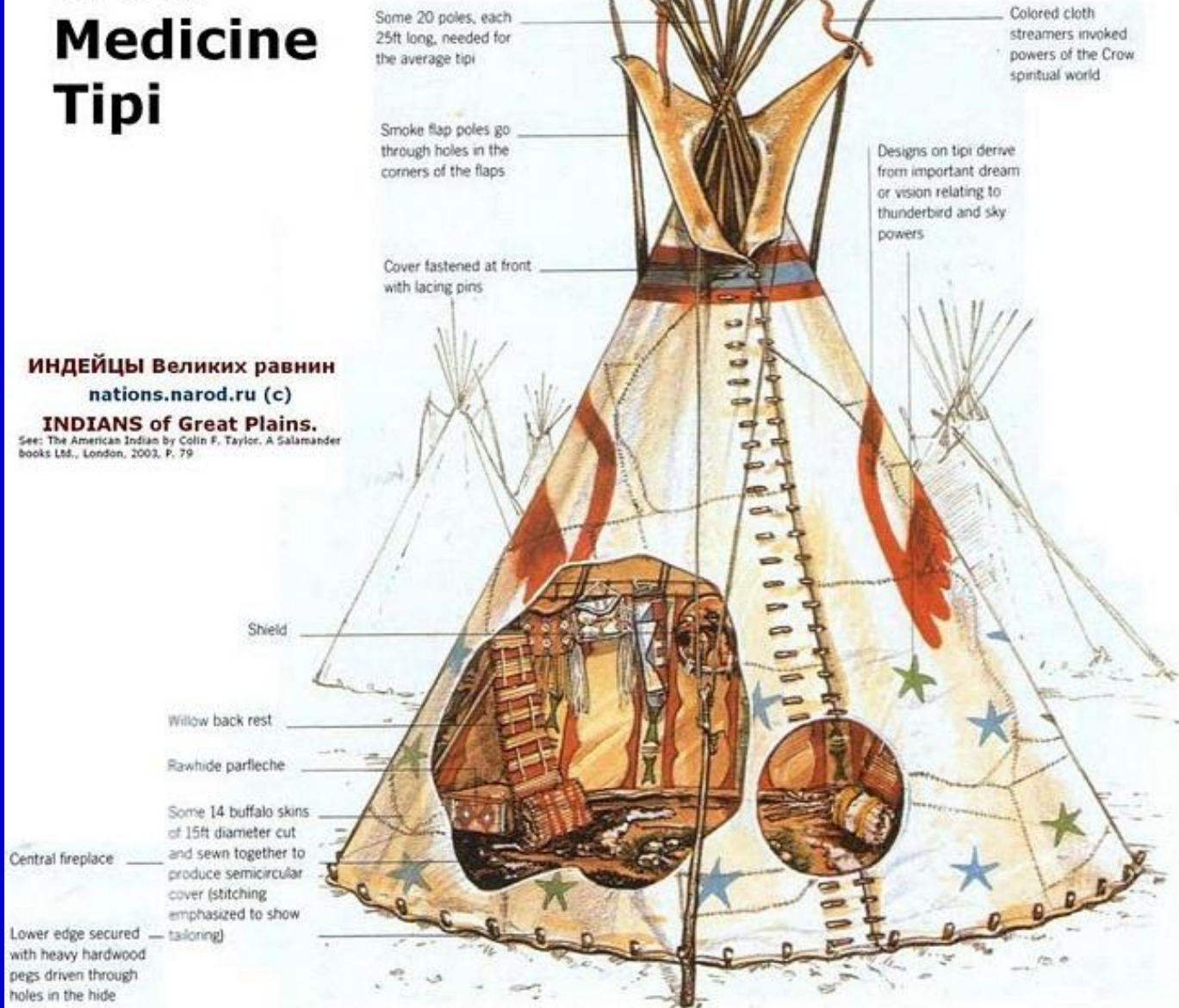

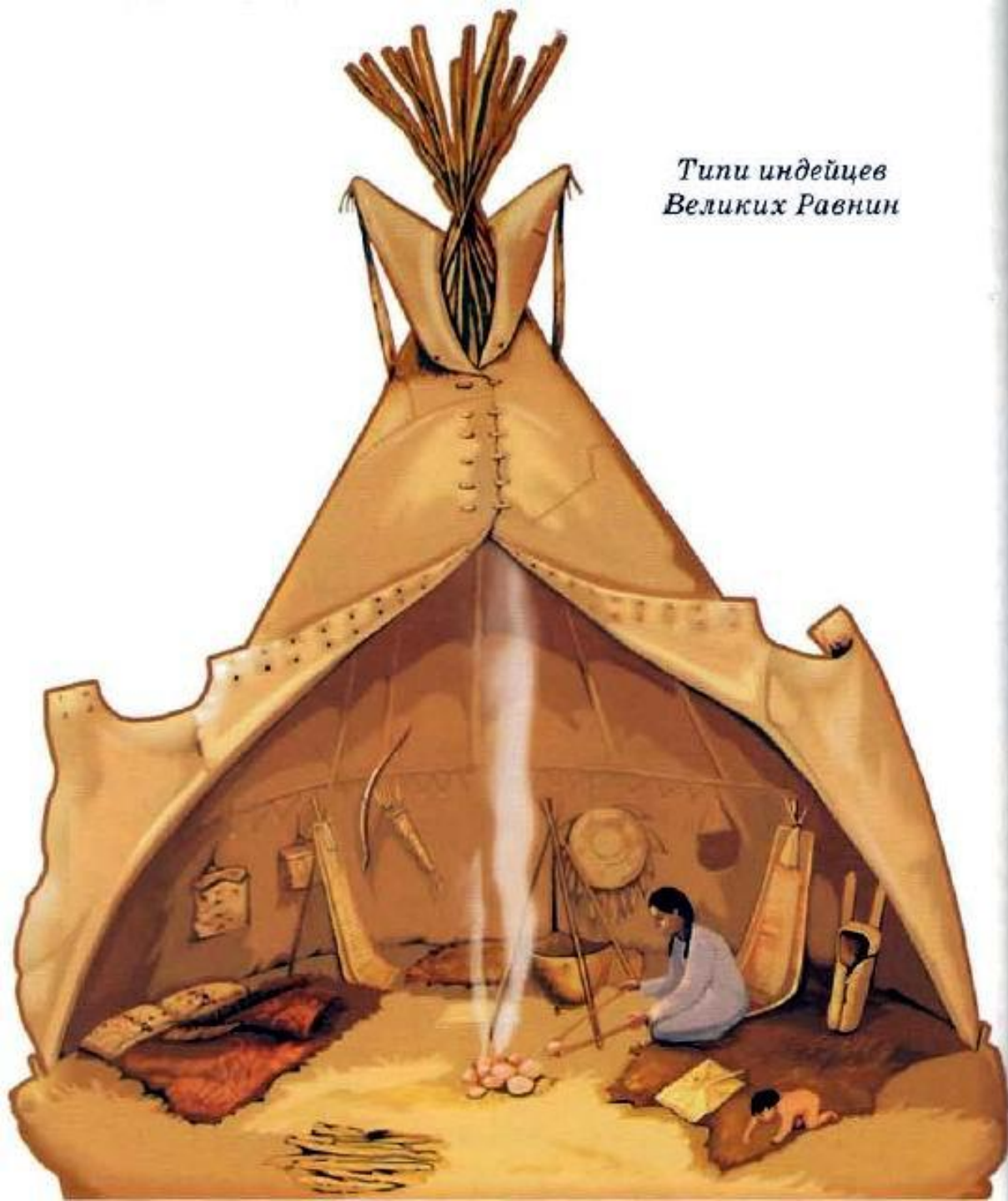

The skill and creativity shown by the weavers come from years of practice. Most weavers work on their rugs at home, while also tending to the daily chores of cooking, child care, going to the store, and herding sheep. The weavers here work about forty hours a week and are paid on a daily or bi-weekly Trading Post. All these rugs are well known for their excellent weaving skills and have won awards in ceremonies and rug shows.

THE WEAVING
The loom is made of wood and consists of a frame of beams and posts. The threads are held in place by a series of bents and are woven together by a shuttle. The shuttle is a small wooden device that carries the weft thread across the warp threads. The shuttle is thrown from one side of the loom to the other and is caught by the weaver's hands.
