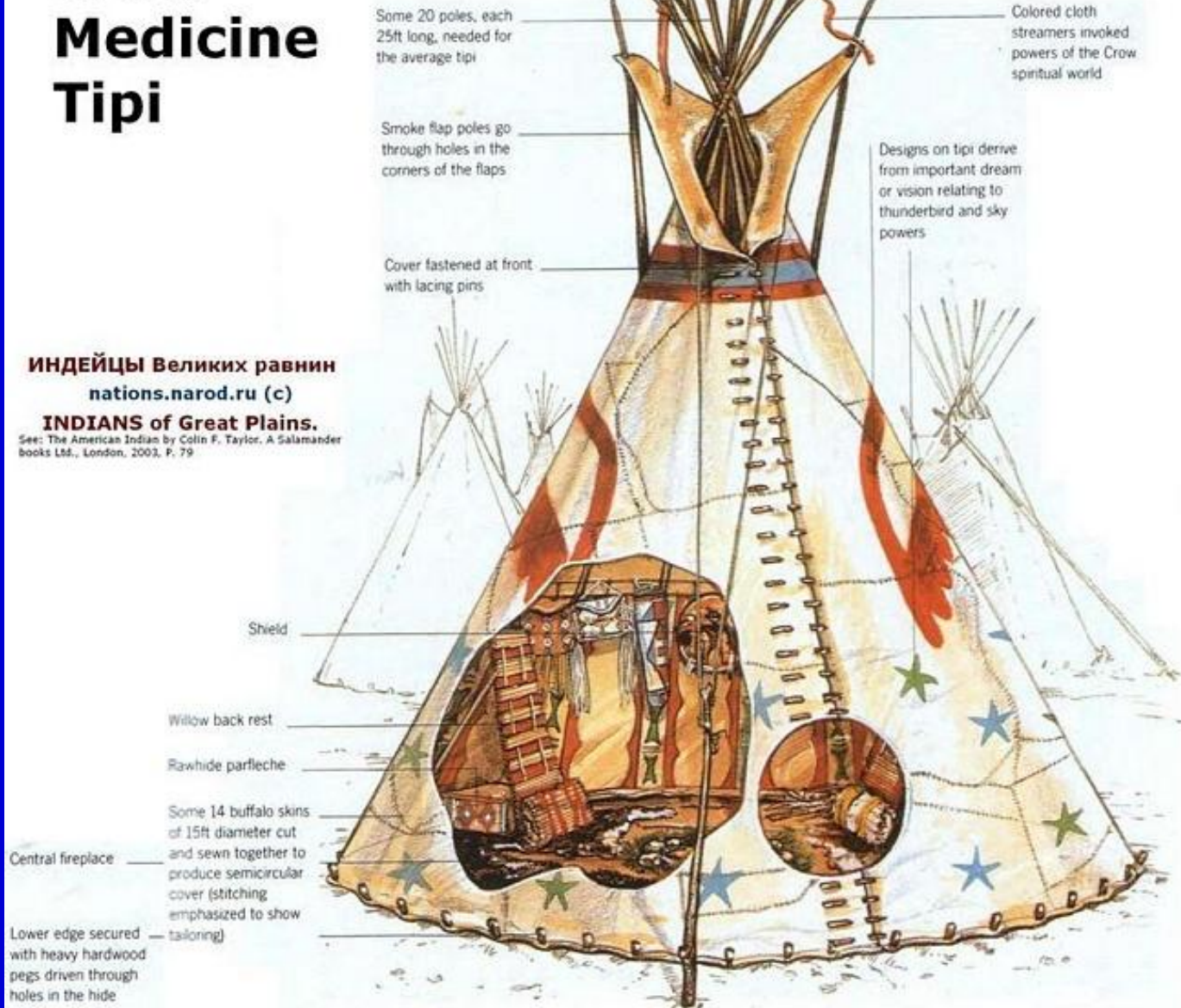

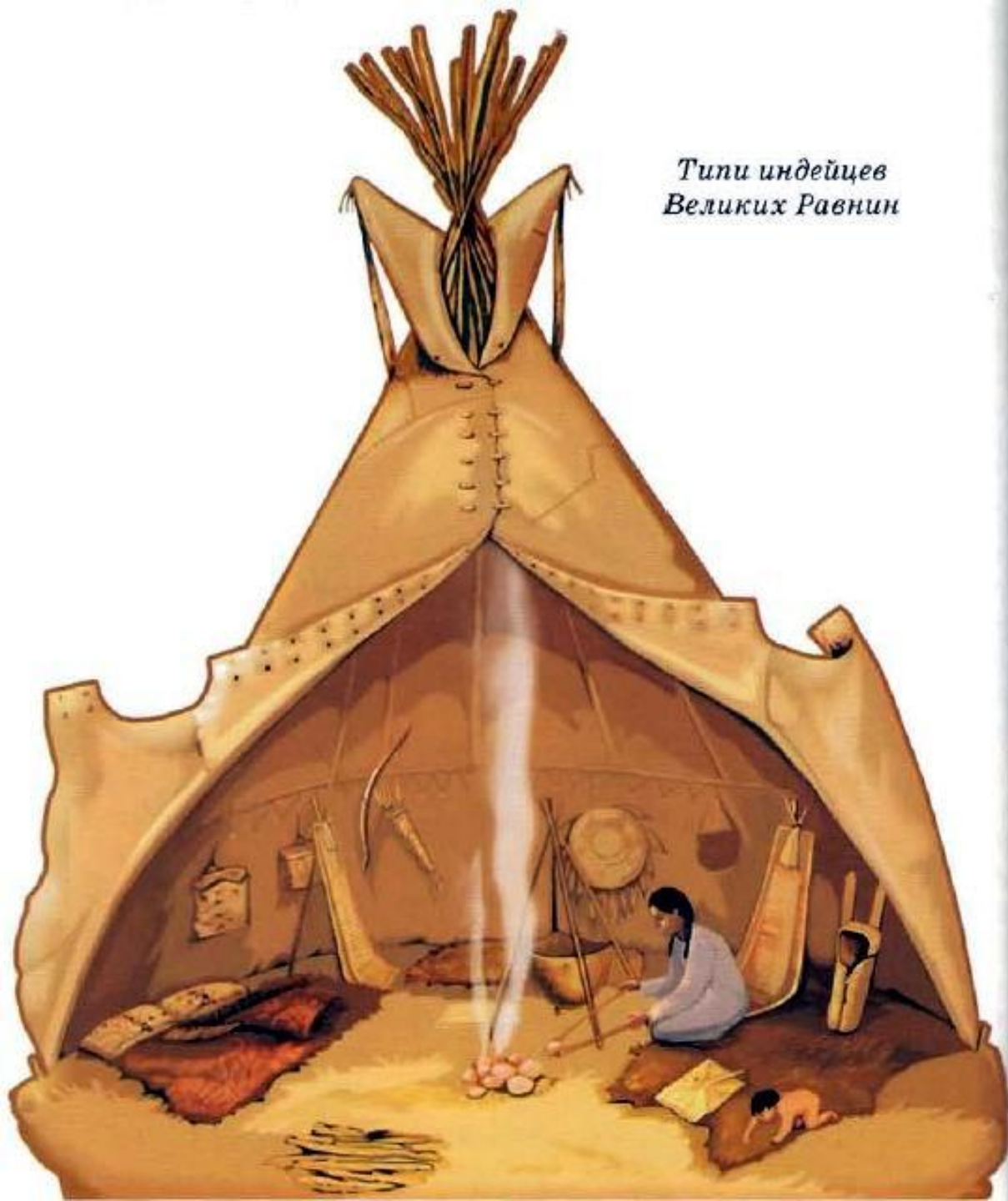

The skill and creativity shown by the weavers come from years of practice. Most weavers work on their rugs at home, while also tending to the daily chores of cooking, child care, going to the store, and herding sheep. The weavers here work about forty hours a week and are paid on a hourly or seasonal basis to demonstrate their craft. The rugs they make are well known for their excellent weaving skills and have won awards in ceremonies and rug shows.

THE WEAVING
The loom is made of wood and consists of a frame of beams and posts. The threads are held in place by a series of bents and are woven together by the weaver's hands. The weaver uses a shuttle to carry the weft threads across the loom. The shuttle is a small wooden device with a hook that catches the threads. The weaver also uses a comb to keep the threads in place and a reed to beat the threads together. The finished rug is then removed from the loom and finished with a fringe.

Although many Navajo speak both Navajo and English, these women speak Navajo and very little English. Please direct your questions to the information desk clerk, the ranger on duty, or to the silversmith.
