

Amelia Mary Earhart



Birthday July 24, 1897

American Aviator, one of the first women pilots, the first woman who managed to fly the Atlantic ocean

October 22, 1922, Amelia Earhart set her first world record, rising to a height of 14,000 feet (about 4,300 m) — higher than it has been until now any female pilot





In 1923, Amelia Earhart became the 16th woman in the world to receive a pilot license from the International aeronautical Federation.

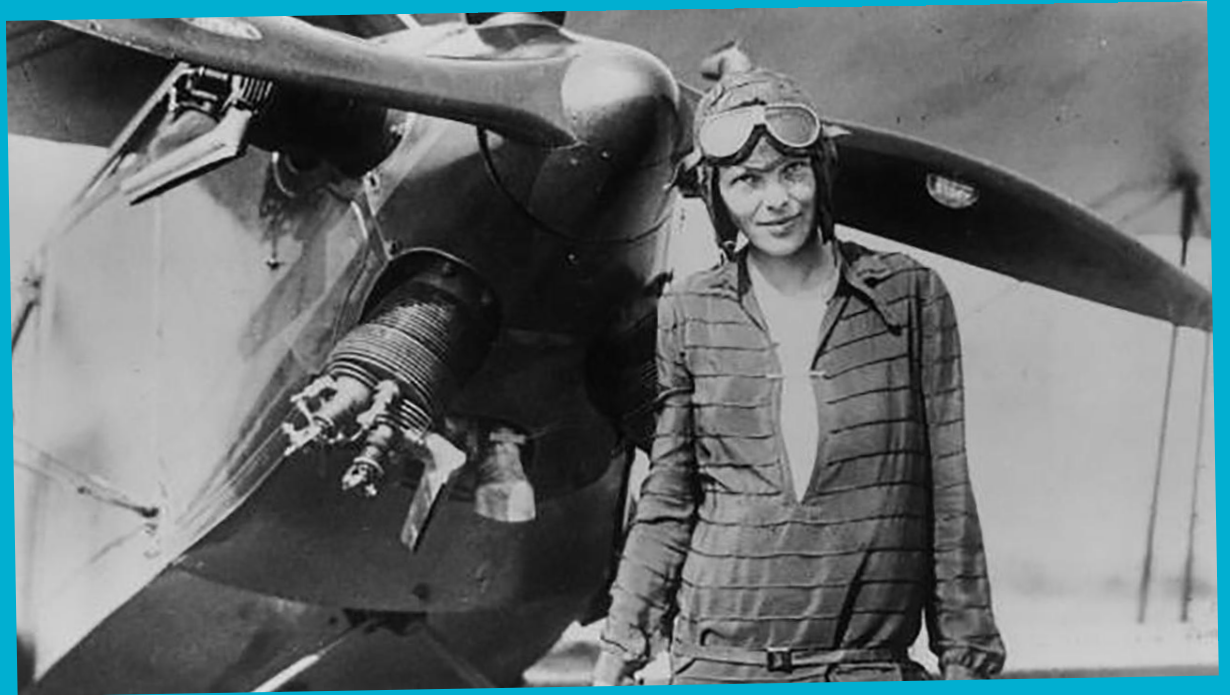
In 1929 she formed the first international organization of women pilots "99" (the name given by its first member), and became involved in air races and to establish various records.





In November of 1929, she broke the world speed record, breaking the plane "VEGA" company "Lockheed" to 197 miles per hour

In 1931, the pilot has mastered the autogyro is a flying machine, which is a mix between a plane and a helicopter; she took a ride to the record height, and then the first flew it across America.





After the overhaul of the aircraft in the US, the Earhart may 20, 1937, beginning a second attempt, now with one Navigator Frederick Noonan.
