


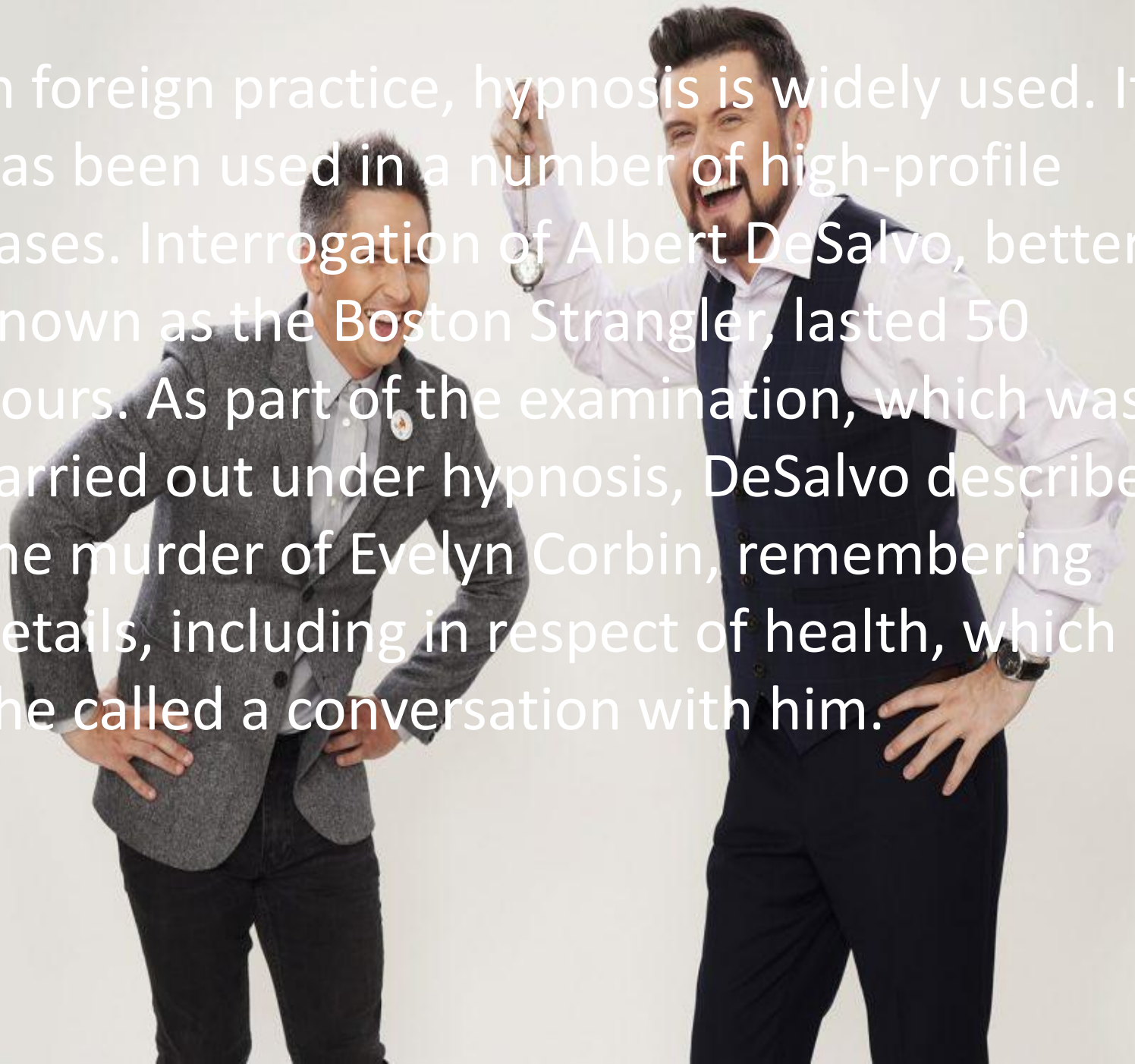



Forensic hypnosis



- Today, the term "hypnosis" is not defined. Translated from the Greek word "hypnosis" is a dream, and what points to flog, giving it the following definition: "Hypnosis is called an artificially induced sleep incomplete certain kind."
