

# Relative pronouns and adverbs

Relative pronouns (who, whose, whom, which, that) and relative adverbs (where, when, why)

- are used to introduce a relative clause in the sentence.
- come after a noun.

Relative Pronoun	Use	Example
<b>who</b>	person (subject)	A vet <b>who</b> got the first prize is Russian.
<b>whose</b>	possession	That's the boy <b>whose</b> father is a famous writer.
<b>whom</b>	person (object)	The old woman <b>whom</b> I helped was Mary's grandma.
<b>which</b>	things	The book <b>which</b> he gave me is very boring.
<b>that</b>	things persons	A vet <b>that</b> got the first prize is Russian. The book <b>that</b> he gave me is very boring.

Relative Adverb	Use	Example
<b>where</b>	place	The camp <b>where</b> we first met is still our favourite place to go to.
<b>when</b>	time	That was the year <b>when</b> we went on holiday to Greece.
<b>why</b>	reason	The reason <b>why</b> she went is still a mystery.
